



EFFING THE RECORDS. REFING THE RECORDS. In looking about a diamond cutting es-tablishment one would hardly suspect the precious character of the material in use. The floors are bare, the windows are open, and any one may enter by the door unchallenged. Much is trusted to the honesty of the workman, but some simple precautions are taken. When a diamond sutter receives an invoice of stones he carefully studies each one, and takes note rarefully studies each one, and takes note of its color, size, weight and shape. The whiter ones look like bits of clear alum, the darker like clouded quartz. The rarest and costliest stones are of sky blue, pink and black. Ordinarily, however, the pure water colored diamond without tint or flaw is most sought after. When the boss cutter has made accu-rate record of his rough diamonds he
