Washington Appears to Be Quite a Favorite as the City in Which the Great Exhibition should its Located.

Port Huron was a few days ago surrounded by forest fires and considerable damage was done, with promise of still more dis-astrous results if the drought, which had lasted two months, should continue. The Petit faru, within the city limits, was completely burned over, and the fences and much property destroyed. A barn and contents on La Peer avenue were burned to the ground, and the grand pavilion in Pine Grove Park was completely destroyed. Other barns within the city limits were burned. It was the driest time in the city in many vers.

Health in Michigau.

Reports to the State Board of Health by forty-eight observers in different parts of the State for the week ended August 31 indicated that cholera infantum, influenza, bronchitis, inflammation of the brain, remittent fever and tonsilitis increased, and inflammation of the bowels, neuralgia, in-inflammation of the bowels, neuralgia, in-termittent fever and whooping cough de-creased in area of prevalence. 



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
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
