Opening Speech in the Dr. Cronin Murder Trial.

Judge Longeneeker Traces the Conspiracy from Its Inception to the Killing-Several Witnesses Give Their Teatimony.

THE TRIAL OPENED

This Third OFERER. Chrocaco, Oct. 35.—The trial of five of the men accused of the murder of Dr. Cronin—Coughlin, O'Sullivan, Beggs, Bgrke and Kunze—was formally begun at 10 o'clock yestenday morning. Wood-ruff is to be tried separately. State's Attorney Langenocher, is making the Attorney Longenocker, in making the opening speech for the prosecution, pro-ceeded to defend the murder of Dr. Cronin as the unlawful killing of the 23, where it had been placed by those who had beaten out his life. There was a motive for his murder, and the speaker claimed that the State would be able to show that the motive arose from the fact that the unfortunate doc-tor was an active member of an Irish organization known as the Clan-na-Gael. There were five members of the execu-tive board, and of these Alexander Sul-

livan, Boland and Feeley formed the famous triangle. The triangle was accused by Dr. Cronin of having plundered the society, and to prevent an exposure, the speaker said, the butchery was planned and executed. The State's Attorney and executed. The State's Attorney traced the conspiracy from its inception to the killing of the doctor, concluding at 2:30 p.m. In his peroration he said that if after hearing the evidence the jury had the slightest doubt of the multiplication of the state of the the guilt of the prisoners they should give them their freedom, but if on the other hand they were satisfied that they were the murderers then he should demand that the highest penalty of the law be inflicted. Counsel for the defendants waived their opening speeches and the examination of witnesses

was commenced without delay. Captain Villiers, of the Lake View police, told of the finding of the bloody trunk, and the identity of the body was sworn to by Joseph C. Keefe, James Holland, Stephen Connolly, H. A. Wisch and Morris Morris, E. Rosch, the employe of the department of public works, who discovered the body in the catch-basin, gave his testimony.
