CHRAOO, Dec. 25.—It was decided Saturday that the eleven jerors in the Cronin case would not for the present is the apablic letter-setting forth the true listory of the workings in the jury-room. A statement has been prepared and submitted to State's Attorney Lagonecker, but on his advice it will be withheld from the public until after the trial of the jury "Exers," which is expected to be held early in January.

The Cronin trial lasted for fifteen weeks, stretching out over 108 days. Eliminating Sundays and ther days when from different causes no court was held, the Cronin trial actually consumed eighty-five days, or seven weeks. The jury getting occupied forty-six days and the hearing of testimony, speeches, etc., thirty-nine-days, exclusive of Sundays and all other days when court adjourned. There was days when court adjourned. There was eight weeks of jury-getting, five weeks of testimony, and two weeks of speech-making, and then, as if to put a fitting climax on it all, a disagreement of the jury came within an acc of undoing the work of all these days and weeks and months.

In order to secure the jury 1,115 citi-sens of Cook County were examined and all but twelve excused. The State excused seventy-eight peremptorily and the defense ninety-seven, while the other ¥28 veniremen were excused for cause. The first venireman was examined Friday, August 20, the last venire-man Tuesday, October 22. In all 207 witnesses testified for and




