

"Yes, some Germans do nothing else but raise the birds for export trade. In some of the large German cities, Ham-burg, for instance, there are several large houses who raise birds entirely for jobsers in New York, with whom they have contracts to furnish them so many hun-freds of birds a season."

"Are these canaries long lived?"

"Mell, that depends a great deal on what you would call long life. Their average life, however, is about ten years, although I have known some to live a great deal longer."—Boston Globe.


