John Jacob Astor, the Well-Known New Fork Milleunive, Passes Away—Heart Fallure the Cause of His Sudden Teking

New York, Feb. 24.—John Jacob Astor died at his residence on Fifth avenue Saturday of heart failure. Mr. Astor complained Friday morning that he was not feeling well, but in the evening he weat out to dinner. Soon after his return home he became so ill that his family were greatly alarmed and sent for their physician, Dr. Fordyce Barkgr, who resides may by at 54 East Thirty-eighth street. He at once hastened to Mr. Astor's bedates, but when he reached it he found his patient already dying. Hardly any pulse was perceptible. Mr. Astor continued to sink slowly until 4 o'clock Saturday morning, when he died. There was present at his death-bed William Waldorf Astor and two other relatives. Mr. Astor left an estate valued at \$150,000,000, which goes to his sen and three daughters, his wife having died two years ago.

Official Report of the South Dake

AN APPEAL FOR HELP Pizzne S. D.; Feb. 20. — That deplorable destitution does exist in South Dakota can be no longer successfully controverted, for H. H. Sheets, of Kingsbury County, chairman of the State relief committee, has just returned from a thorough canvais of every section which has sent up an appeal for aid, and states unqualifiedly that the setflets are in sore distress in hundreds of cases. In Miner, Kingsbury, Beadle, Fallk and Edmunds counties the drought was general and the harvest practically a failure, while large areas in Clark, Jerthid, Spink, Walworth, McPherson, Hand, Hyde, McCook, Hanson, Broyn and Campbell yielded barely sufficient to supply broad to the farmers and their families.

Mr. Sheets has made a careful estimate of the number of bushels of seed wheat which must be provided for the needy farmers before seeding time and places his figures at from 500,000 to 600,000 toshels. The estimate may be accepted in reliable, for the data come in the main from the Board of Commissioners of the several counties. The money to purchase this grafa must come by the way of private and public subscriptions, for 11 is now admitted on all hands that the State or county, under the provisions of the constitution, is absolutely powerless to render any aid.


