# DREADFUL TIDINGS.

### Several States Swept by a Death-Dealing Cyclone

Louisville, Ky., Partially Wrecked and Many Persons Killed-A Like Dis-aster in Indiana and Illisols Towns.

THE LOUISVILLE HORROR. LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 28. - The number of lives lost in the cyclone of Thursday night is now pretty definitely known to be 103, and the injured 125. The property loss will be about \$2,000.-

000. The search for victims is going stead-ily on, and each hour adds largely to the already long list. In many places the men labor in great danger of being buried beneath the tottering walls at any moment, and other accidents are looked for momentarily. From Seventh street and the river as far down as can be seen one continuous sea of desolation meets the eye and be-wilders the thousands of spectators, who never dreamed of any thing so ter-






