Hay, Spring and Belle creeks, streams from fifteen to thirty feet in width, were in a few moments converted into raging tor-rents, in places almost a mile in width, sweeping all before them. On Hay creek two mill dans were carried out, large numbers of live stock drowned and people compelled to flee for their lives.

MAZEPPA, Minn., June 6. - The heaviest rain-storm ever known here struck this region during Wednesday night. The Zumbro river was soon in night. 


