MAKING NEW LAWS.

Work of the Legislators in Senate and House.

Daily Summary of Proceedings Con-taining All the Important Work Done by the Nation's Law-Makers Up to Date.

Washington, July L.—In the house yesterday W. H. Dickerson was sworn in as the successor of Mr. Carlisle from the Sixth Kentucky district. A bill was introduced providing for the appointment by the President of a commission, consisting of five persons, to make an impartial and thorough investigation of social vice in all its phases, in relation to labor and wages, marriage and divorce and the general welfare of the people. The Federal elections bill was further discussed. WASHINGTON, July 2.—In the House yesterday the Blair educational bill

The Federal elections bill was taken up and was the subject of pro-tracted debate.

As Mr. Cole-man (I.a.) cast his vote with the Democrats he was greeted with applause from that side of the House, and the applause was rein-forced with cheers when Mr. Lehlbach (N. J.) also cast his vote Lehlbach (N. J.) also cast his vote against the measure. The Republicans retaliated in kind, and as the Southern Republicans, Messrs. Houk, Taylor (Tenn.), Waddill, Mndd (Md.) and Wilson (Ky.), recorded their votes in the affirmative cheer after cheer was given.

A MONUMENT UNVAILED.

STERLING, Ill., July 5.-By far the most important event in the history of Sterling occurred Friday, when the Sol-diers' and Sailors' monument was un-vailed and presented to the city by the Monument Association in the presence of 15,000 people. There was a proces-sion two miles long, comprising G. A. R. posts, Sons of Veterans, camps, Knights of Pythias and Patriotic Sons of Americs. A gigantic trades display, inter-spersed with several bands of music, paraded the streets at 2 o'clock.

After the parade the unvailing of the nonument, a splendid shaft sixty feet high, bearing the names of Whiteside County's fallen heroes, occurred in Cen-tral Park. Moses Dillon, president of the Monument Association, made the presentation speech, and the monument was accepted by Mayor J. L. Lawrence. General R. A. Aiger Jellvered a brief but eloquent address, and General John McNulta delivered an oration.


