THE AWFUL CYCLONE.

It Causes Death and Ruin at South

Eight Persons Love Their Lives and Seven ty Others Are I adily Injured - Hundreds Left Homeless - Buildings Crushed Like Egg-Shelle

THE WIND DEMON.

BOSTON, July 28.—The flourishing city of Lawrence was visited Saturday by one of the most sudden and destructive cyclenes known to the Eastern States, and eight persons were killed, sixty sectionsly injured, seventy buildings were clously injured, seventy buildings were clously injured, seventy buildings were wrecked or destroyed and 600 people made homeless. Such is the summarry of the catastrophe. The property loss will aggregate about \$125,000.

Unfortunately, it will fall almost wholly upon the industrious poor, and in only a single case was it insured against the elements. The path of the storm was only about 400 feet wide, but starting from the Boston & Maine railty and station in the southern section of the city it extended parallel with the Merrimac river four miles clear into Andover. The force of it ceased as suddenly as it thad appeared. 


