RAILWAY HORRORS.

Many Lives Lost in Various Por

PASSENGERS CRUSHED. CLEVELANI. O. Sept. 8.—A frightful socident occurred at the Wilson avenue crossing of the New York, Chicago & St. Louis railroad in this city about 7:30 o'clock Saturday night by which at least a dozen persons were terribly injured, some of them fatally, and one killed. The crossing is on a steep grade, down which runs an electric street-railroad line.

freight train was standing close to the crossing on the south track. An electric motor drawin, one car was ap-proaching from the south. The safety gates were up and the road apparently clear. Just as the motor had crossed the railroad track a locomotive running about thenty miles an hour dashed out from behind the freight train.

The pilot of the engine struck the electric train between the motor and the trailer, tearing them apart and hurling one to each side of the track.

hurling one to each side of the track. At least a score of persons were on the trailer and they were tumbled about in all directions, some being thrown a dozen feet away and others pinned under the car, which was demolished.

RAILWAY HORSION IN COLORADO.

CANYON CITY. Col., Sept. 8 — A terri-ble accident occurred on the Denver & Rio Grande road at 5 o'clock Saturday morning near Florence. The train was running in two sections. The second section dashed into the disabled train with terrific force, smashing the two coaches, injuring over thirty men and killing a number outright. SUDDENLY STRICKEN. Ex-Governor Noyes, of Ohlo, Drops Dead

CINCINNATI. Sept. 5. - Judge Edward F. Noyes, ex-Governor of Onio, dropped dead vesterday while walking from the dead yesterday white waiting from the court-house to the sidewalk. Just as he reached the gateway he staggered, and in trying to regain his footing pitched forward before anybody could reach him, and struck his head against a stone wall. Several gentlemen rushed forward and raised him from the ground but before medical assistant

[Governor Noyes would have been 28 years of age had he lived until Cotober 3. He was a native of Massachusetts and prior to entering Dartmouth College, from which he was graduated in 187, he worked five years in a printing office. Removing to this city in 1826 he took the course in the Chilo Law School and entered upon practice at the bar. He entered the Ushon army in July, 1850, as Major of the Thirty-ninth Ohlo Infantry and served through sampaigna in Missouri, on the Jower Mississippiriver and in Georgia. At the battle of Bur Mill, he lost a leg. He was brevetted a Brigadier-General of volunteers in April 1855. The same year he became city solicitor of Cincinnati, and a little later was elected probate judge of Hamilton County. In 1871 he was elected Governor of Ohlo, but as the succeeding election was defeated by "Old Bill?" Allen in 1871 President Hayes appointed General N. yes Minister to France, which post he resigned in 1881 to resume the practice of the law, Governor Noyes has not taken a very softwe part in poiltles in recent years.






