



This effort to obtain a receivership, which means the temporary control of the whole railway, generally results in a violent struggle between different interests, either to secure or maintain the management through the receivership. The determination of whether a receivership is to be had, and of the person or The determination of whether a receiver-ship is to be had, and of the person or persons to be such receivers, lies in the hands of a single judge. This class of cases gives to the circuit judges of the United States, by transferring to them the management and operation of vest railway properties, a degree of responsi-bility and patronage never originally in-tended to be placed in their power. The opportunities thus presented to a

tended to be placed in their power.

The opportunities thus presented to a court of justice for the exercise of patronage, the reward of friends, the selection of counsel for receivers, the appointment of masters, and the manipulation and adjustment of large pecuniary intro and adjustment of large pecuniary interests, are in themselves very much to be deprecated. While no scandals of any magnitude have as yet arisen from this power of appointment and the pat-ronage and pecuniary expenditure inci-dent thereto, it is, after all said and
