OPEN WAR DECLARED.

NEW YORK, Oct 3 - Third Vice-President Webb, of the New York Central railroad, has issued a circular, which has been sent to the heads of the various departments, announcing that the proof objects to the various departments, announcing that the road objects to its employes being Knights of Labor. Officials are requested to call the attention of employes to the circular. The document states that the recent atrike, the acts of lawlessness committed in connection therewith, the published correspondence between the leaders of the organization that ordered it, and the fact that many men now seeking re-employment state men now seeking re-employment state that they quit work from fear of personal violence and did not dare to resume work for the same reason, force the management of the company to this decision, being satisfied that membership in this particular organization is inconsistent with faithful and efficient services to the

faithful and efficient service to the company, and is likely at any time to prevent it from properly discharging its duties to the public.

STOCK STATISTICS.

The number of hors a in the State last May, as shown by the farm statis-tics just issued, was 394,883; milch cows, 405,615; cattle, other than milch cows, 363,519; bogs. 433,748; sheep. 1,938,934. Compared with the statistics of a year earlier, there is an increase of 11,892 in the number of horses, and of 2.542 in the number of milch cows, and a de-crease of 36,586 in cattle other than milch cows, of 5,258 hogs, and of 26,725 mich cows, of 5,255 hogs, and of 28,135 sheep. The number of sheep reported sheared in 1809 is 1,944,297; pounds of wool, 11,983,491, an average per head of 61-6 pounds. 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

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


