ENR, Pa., Oct. 20.—A catastrophe was averted on the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern railway Sunday near Silver Creek through the bravery and cool-headed conduct of an engineer. A detached section of a east-bound freight train had been run into by another section of the freight and a portion of the debris was thrown over on the west-bound track just as No. 8, a fast train, was going west. Engineer John Burns of Buffalo, of the passenger train was coming down the hill at the rate of fifty miles an hour. OHIO LEGISLATURE.

Proceedings of the Extra Session Called by Governor Campbell.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 18.—The bills providing for the abolishment of the board of improvements and decennial board at Cincinnati were read the second time in the Senate Wednesday and referred to the authors with the leave to report. Resolutions looking to an investigation of the rumors of dishonesty on the part of members of the boards were offered in either branch and went over under the rules.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 17.—The caucus compromise bill giving the Governor power to remove the members of the Board of Improvements at Cincinnati and appoint a non-partisan board till April, when their successors shall be elected by the people, passed the Senate Thursday and is now in the hands of the House. Resolutions for committees of investigation of the boards and departments at Cincinnati to consider a plan of government for that city and report at the next session were also adopted by the Senate and are pending in the House.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 18.—The Legislature has adopted a resolution providing for a committee to investigate alleged corruption in certain boards at Cincinnati and various departments of the city government, and another to consider and make suggestions upon a plan of government for that city and report at the next session.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 20.—The House, after a stormy session, refused to pass the Senate compromise bill, giving the Governor power to remove the members of the Cincinnati board of improvements, and providing for a new board with election next April. The vote stood 23 yeas to 33 nays. Fifty-eight yeas are required to pass a bill. Several of the Hamilton County members voted against the bill.

SHOT A PRISONER.

A Kansas track man's Revenge Upon the Man Who Stabbed His Brother.

GERMANTOWN, Kan., Oct. 20.—As the train on the Southern Kansas was pulling Saturday morning J. C. Vandyske was shot and fatally wounded by Sol Long. Both are brakemen on the Southern Kansas railroad. Vandyske was at the time under arrest and handcuffed, having been arrested by the marshal of Grenola for stabbing Long's brother Friday at Winfield. Long came on the train and without a word walked up to Vandyske and shot him in the back.

SALE LAKE CITY, Utah, Oct. 17.—John T. Lambert, John Jones and a man named Johnson were convicted yesterday, charged with unlawful exaltation. Lambert and Johnson gave bail in the sum of \$1,000, but Jones failed to give bonds and was sent to prison to await the action of the grand jury. James H. Baker was convicted of unlawful exaltation before Judge Blackmore, at Provo, and was sentenced to six months in the penitentiary.

MICHIGAN STATE NEWS.

Health in Michigan.

Reports to the State Board of Health by twenty-six observers in different parts of the State for the week ended October 11 indicated that inflammation of brain, cerebro-spinal meningitis, whooping cough, pleuritis, dysentery, inflammation of the bowels and pneumonia increased, and typhoid fever and measles decreased in area of prevalence. Diphtheria was reported at twenty-six places, scarlet fever at thirty-four, typhoid fever at forty-seven and measles at six places.

Michigan's Crops.

The winter apple crop in Michigan is little more than a quarter of an average crop. The October crop report shows that apples will yield only 25 per cent. of an average crop in the southern counties, 30 per cent. in the central, and 27 per cent. for the State as a whole. Potatoes will yield 50 per cent. of an average crop, corn 53 bushels per acre, and wheat, and barley, 18 7/8 bushels per acre. The report shows the yield of wheat in the State to be 23,519,329 bushels.

Fire on a Lake Steamer.

The steamer Remora, for Port Huron, with about 850 passengers aboard, was discovered on fire when about six miles from St. Clair Falls. The passengers were panic-stricken and were all driven to the upper deck by the flames and smoke. The fire was fought ineffectually by the crew until the tug Jessie came alongside and poured water into the hold, subduing the flames. After examination it was found that the vessel was unharmed, and the vessel proceeded.

A Cow Club.

Iron Mountain has a cow club. On joining each cow owner pays to the treasury seventy-five cents for each cow in his possession and when a member's cow dies or is lost the full amount is paid to the loser. After the inflation the assessments are all the members pay into the club, and as the membership already exceeds 100 a comparatively insignificant sum is levied upon each. Three claims have already been paid.

A Toxophilite.

Nelson Ross and Henry Muldoon went hunting at Alpena. Ross shot a bird and while in the thick brush looking for him Muldoon mistook him for a deer and shot him dead. Coroner Shannon heard an inquest, the jury bringing in a verdict of accidental shooting. Ross was about 30 years of age, unmarried, and his parents live in Canada.

To Bridge the Detroit River.

President Leyland of the Michigan Central road says that the recent sounding and survey of the river opposite the depot in Detroit were for the purpose of procuring estimates for a high bridge across the Detroit river. A tunnel, besides being costly, would, he says, be unpopular, and few people would travel by such a route.

Explosion of Mill Motors.

The boilers in the saw-mill of the Ducey Lumber Company at North Muskegon exploded, demolishing the mill and fatally injuring William Weaver, the foreman, who died soon after. Several laborers about the mill had arms and legs broken. The loss to the mill was \$12,000, with no insurance.

Drowned in Trying to Save Her Child.

Mrs. William Wehman, 42, and her 7-year-old son were drowned in a well at their home near Marine City. The boy fell into the well by accident and the mother bearing his cries ran frantic, plunged into the water, and was also drowned before she came. Mrs. Wehman was 48 years old.

Those of our citizens who imagined that there was a fire alarm or a riot in town early last Monday morning, were mistaken. It was only a party of young ladies, among them being a sprinkling of Saranac school marms, who had been visiting in Lyons and were hastening to catch the morning train. They were cheering on the driver of the "bus."

The prosecuting attorney, county treasurer and county clerk of Montcalm county were receiving \$1,500, \$1,000 and \$25 respectively, but the board of supervisors thought the salaries were too much, so they cut that of the prosecuting attorney down to \$1,300, of the treasurer to \$500 and that of the clerk to \$25. The valuation of property in Montcalm county as fixed by the board of supervisors last year was \$7,750,000. The amount paid by each taxpayer whose assessment is \$1,000 toward the salaries of these officials is three and seven tenths cents.

The fire flood seems to have struck the village of Caledonia with a vengeance. On last Saturday night, during a driving rain, the barn owned by J. N. Bricker was totally destroyed. Cause of fire unknown, but is supposed to be of incendiary origin, and Thursday at about 1 o'clock fire broke out in the roof and ceiling of the house of Robert Kennedy, brick manufacturer. By the prompt assistance of about one hundred citizens the fire was extinguished after having damaged the house to the amount of about \$300. The contents were all saved, but were badly damaged by the drenching rain.

"Andy" Fife never sang sweeter than last Sunday evening, when he sang "I fear no ill" at the Fountain Street Baptist church. He little thought that while he was delighting the audience with his song that some one was inspecting a \$15 overcoat he had left in the vestibule of the church, but such was the case, and when "Andy" looked for his coat it was not there. In its place hung a ragged coat that would require a chart to get in it, as a result Mr. Fife was not in a comfortable frame of mind yesterday. He did intend, however, that if the fellow who took the coat was hard up for a suit he would furnish him one and throw in a watch and chain.—Gd. Rapids Press.

According to the St. Paul Pioneer Press, C. M. Wheeler is wanted as badly at West Superior, Wis., as in Iowa county. He will be remembered as the raveling man who was alleged to have doped with Gettler Whiteacre, of Beloit, after she had forged her uncle's name and obtained the cash on several notes. He was arrested for implication in the forgery; but after giving bail went to West Superior.

The Philip Carl, a real estate agent, sold a large amount of property listed with another real estate agent while the latter was absent from the city, signing his name to receipts for small cash payments.

When cornered, Wheeler wrote checks as returns of the advance payments made and just before his hasty departure obtained \$300 on a worthless check. The mortgagor fixed their losses at about \$1,000. Wheeler is said to have last levied in Duluth bucket shop deals.—Sarasota Local.
