LONDON. Nov. 17.—The Times, referring to the financial silustion, says:

"The city has passed through a crisis verging on a panic. Such a time has not been known since the suspension of Overend, Gurney & Co. We rejoice that we are able to announce that the worst is over. The Bank of England has added to its historic services to the state and the commercial committee be its prompt action in averting what would have been a lamentable catastrophs. The administration of the bank nut only provided yast re-enforcements to its stock of gold to meet exceptional demands in the event of a panic, but also attepped out of the ordinary routine of business to pre-

amailer but important firms.

The great financial house referred to
is that of Baring Bros. & Co. They
have been helped through by the Bank
of England, the Rothschilds and several London jo nt stock banks, who made large advances to the firm. The Baring Bros. position is now believed

oncorning the weakness of the Barings oncorning the weakness of the Barings is a matter of some anxiety to the Treasurer of the United States and of great consequence to the diplomatic consular and nava: service abroad. The Barings are the financial agents of our Government in Europe and have been since 1798. In the year 1842 Alexander Baring, the then head of the boose, negotiated the treaty between the United States and Canada and was made Lord Ashburton for his distinguished. United States and Canada and was made. Lord Ashburton for his distinguished services. The acquaintances Lord Ash-burton made over here inured to the credit of his banking house, and in 1846 Robert J. Walker, the Secretary of the Treasury, went to England and negoti-ated through the Barings the first loan of the Mexican war. \$16,000,003.

During the civil war the Barings con-ducted the enormous foreign business of the United States, and in such a satisfactory manner that President Lin-coln wrote the head of the house a per-sonal letter of thanks, which is now formed and hangs in the private office of the firm. In 1862, when General Grant became President, he was persuaded to have the American freign account deposited with Jay Cook, McCullough & Co., which arrangement continued until 1872, when upon the failure of that house, the account was again that bouse, the account was again transferred to the Barings, where it has since remained. Few people have any idea of the amount of money the United States must keep in Europe. On November 1 our account amounted to £250,000, or upward of \$2,500,000.

Aux ous Depositors. MOUNT STERLING, III., Nov. 17 .- Ow ing to the death of President Cowen of the banking firm of Cowen. Gowenlock & Co., this city, the bank remained closed for a few days. As it did not reopen the depositors became suspicious and impatient, particularly when Dave Gowenlock, the cashier, left town to raise funds. As he failed to return the depositors forced the safe and found only about \$200 in silver. The depositor are now wondering what has become of the \$15,000 or \$20,000 that was in the bank.





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
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
