THE INSH (RISIS. LONDON, Nov. &-Justin McCarthy is now the leader of the Irish Parliament-ary party. Mr. Parnell was deposed on Saturday by a vote of 45 to 28 after one Cuffs, per pair, 4c of the most exciting and stormy seasons yet held by the Irish members.

Finally, Mr. Sexton gave Mr. Parnell his ultimatum to the effect Mr. Parnell his ultimatum to the effect that if a decision on this question was delayed by the chairman—Mr. Parnell—after 6 o'ciock in the evening the majority of the representatives of the party would hold a meeting of their own and depose him from office. It was 3:15 before the members reassembled. A strongly-worded letter from Archbishop Walsh was read, demanding Parnell's removal. The reading of this latter produced a marked effect. Mr. John O'Connor moved the adoption of a resolution declaring that Mr. Gladstone's letter was not satisfactory and that Ireland required assurances regarding the constabulary and land questions. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kenny. onded by Mr. Kenny.

The Irish Parliamentary fund, amounting to £20,00, remains under the control of Mr. Parnell, with the exception of £1,000, which is in the hands of the treasurer.




