





Scores of the Creations of Modern Time Surpass Any or All of the Wonders of the Ancients-Some of America's Remarkable Achievements.

Compared with the seven wonders of Compared with the seven wonders or the world classified by the ancients there are seven times seven wonders now. The fabled Colossus of Rhodes, the Alexan-drian lighthouse, the banging gardens of Babylon, sink into insignificance beside the achievements of modern times. The Colossus of Rhodes was, in all probabil-ity, a myth, while the Bartholdi statue is an accomplished fact, and undoubtedly equal in point of achievement to any of the seven wonders of the ancients, not even excepting the pyramids.

As a matter of fact, the real wonders of the world, albeit they have ceased for

of the world, albeit they have ceased for the most part to be wonders by reason of familiarity, represent inventions rather than engineering and architect-ural skill; the railway, the steambont, the photograph, the telescope and the self-binding reaper are in themselves won-ders of which the Egyptians and the Greeks never dreamed. 
