The Seventh Cavalry Recapture

A SUCCESSFUL CHASE.

PINE RIDGE, S. D., Dec. 29.—lig Foot and his band of hostiles have been captured by the Seventh Cavalry, under Major Whitesides. The enpure was made on Porcupine creek without a conflict. All the other Indians in the Bad Lands have decided to come in, and the 120 men and 250 women and children oses of the hostile element and it now seems certain that all are coming in. RAFID CITY, S. D., Dec. 29.—General Miles has just received a dispatch from General Brooke stating that Major Whiteside had captured Big Foot's camp. General Miles expresses the opinion that the outfit will not again escape the military. The Indians that took refuge is the fastnesses of the Bad Lands, failing to receive aid from Sitting Bull and seeing themselves surrounded by troops with a fight to the death or starvation confronting them, yielded to the solicitations of the friendlies and are slowly moving into the agency. Miles' scouts and cavalry are in possession of their natural strongholds. Thus, by the aid of the ruilroad and telegraph and the unprecedented quick movement of troops around and all over the reservations, the hostiles find themselves confronted at every point by troops and at last it dawns upon the savage minu that a further contest with the forces of civilization is too unequal and can not recently wither headcausters will be in a further contest with the forces of civilization is too unequal and can not prevail. Miles' headquarters will be in the saddle after to-day. He will pro-bably start this morning for Pine Ridge through the reservation, via the Bad Lands, with an escort of scouts and the Sight Leveler.

DISASTROUS LAKE SEASON.

Fifty-Five Vessels Lost with a Financial
Loss of \$713,000 the Last Year.

DETHOUT, Mich., Dec. 29.—The last
season has been unusually disastrous to

learned that sixteen steamers, whose to
tal tomage was \$.915 tons, and whose
value was \$335,500, were lost. Twentyseven schooners and barges valued at
\$378,000 and with a tomage of \$.555
tons were also lost, as well as twelve
tugs valued at \$79,000 and \$30 tons burden, making the total number of vessels
lost 55, with an aggregate tonnage of
15,020 tons and a financial loss of \$713,000.






