"WHEREAS, Pursuant to section 3, act of Conus, approved October 1, 1820, entitled As to Reduce the Revenue and Equalize attes on Imports and for Other Perposes, the acteur of State of the United States of merica communicated to the United States of reall the action of the Congress of the United States of America with a view to secure reprocal trade in declaring the articles commerced in said section 3—to wit, sugars, molasses, sides and bides to be exempt from duty upon self importation into the United States of merica; and

"WHENKAR The Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Pienipotentiary of Brazil at Washington has communicated to the Secretary of State the fact that, in due reciprocity and for consideration of the admission into the United States of America free of all duty of the articles enumerated in section 3 of said act, the Government of Brazil has, by legal enactment, authorized the admission from and after April 1, 1841, into all the established ports of entry of Brazil, free of all duty, whether National, State or municipal, of the articles of merchandise named in the following schedule, provided that the same be the product and manufacture of the United States of America.
