A WARRIOR GONE.

Moltke, one of the great historic fig-ures of the German empire, died aud-denly Friday night at his residence in this city. He was an interested spec-tator of the proceedings in the reichstag Friday afternoon, and appeared in ex-cellent health, laughing and chat-ting pleasantly with Chancel-lor von Caprivi and several members of the reichstag. After the session he lingered in the lobby a few minutes conversing with a number of army officers, and then was driven to his residence. At 9:30 o'clock Friday to his residence. At 9:30 o'clock Friday night his physicians were summoned, but on their arrival a few minutes later they found the general dead and ed the cause heart disease. While the general was sitting in his chair reading he suddenly gasped and without a word expired. The family entertained hopes that he could be resuscitated but the physicians at once determined that he was dead. The news spread rapidly through the city and on every hand created the most profound sorrow. Count von Moltke was born at Parchim on October 26, 1800 In 1822 he entered the army, and was made chief marshal of the German empire in 1871 and was created count in 1872.
