





Without United States Wheat Europe
Would the on the Verge of Families.

Loydon, Aug. 10.—Beerbolm, calculating that America will be able to
spare 25,000,000 quarters of wheat,
estimates the surplus aggregate of countries with a good harvest at 50,000,000
quarters, and the requirements of other
countries at 48,000,000 quarters.

The News, commenting on these
figures, says it is not many years since
Europe was practically independent of
American supplies. This season it is
clear that without America's help
Europe will be on the verge of starvation before the next harvest.
