MINOR NEWS ITEMS.

For the Week Ending Sept. 21. Hamilton, O., celebrated its 100th birthday on Friday. The business portion of the town of Needles, Cal., was totally destroyed by fire.

St. William Herring, postmaster at St. Johns, O., was murdered by chicken thieves. The Western association baseball team has been awarded the Sioux City (Ia.) club.

MINOR NEWS ITEMS.

Joseph Harper and Herbert Thompson (referred to) were drowned at Peoria Sunday by the capsizing of a boat. Ralph B. Stanley was killed at a baseball game at Carson, Nev., by being struck on the neck by the ball.

At Reno, Nev., Louis Ortiz, a well-known desperate character was lynched by a mob for fatally shooting Officer Nash. A freight train was wrecked near Glenwood Springs, Col., and three men and thirty-five head of cattle were killed.

At Woodland, Cal., J. W. Montgomery killed Miss Adams because she refused to marry him and then took his own life. The steamer Mordred, on her way to the coast, was wrecked on the rocks near Monterey.

Hon. Frank B. Johnson, Lansing's able mayor, is a staunch and uncompromising democrat, but this fact does not prevent him from announcing in the local papers that he would no longer keep the dangerous low test squabcock oil on sale at his place of business and had made arrangements to handle thereafter only such kerosene oil as would stand the test which was abolished by the legislature.

Judge Chambers imposed a fine of \$300 upon a Detroit citizen Monday for having a party at his home with a case of scarlet fever on his premises. The man pleaded that his doctor told him there would be no objections, and if this is true it is a pity that the doctor cannot be punished in place of the man, in addition to a penalty for his own ignorance and carelessness.

Tomkins D. Jernisan, of Adrain, and Dora Heick, of Tecumseh, wanted to get married. Their parents, like Bertis, were willing so the day was set, the guests invited and all went well until the country clerk was called upon for a license, and then the trouble began. The crowd was not eighteen years old and under the Michigan law was too much an infant to be allowed to take the responsibilities of a family, so he got no license.

His widow responded to the telegram announcing his death, and saw his body in the coffin, and his attending physician, Dr. Morton, assured her that the remains would be promptly forwarded to this city for burial.
