BALMACEDA A SUICIDE.

VALPARAISO, Sept. 21.—Ex-President attorney general on the meaning salmaceda, of Chili, shot himself of the phrase "whence he came." The through the temple in his room at the Argentine legation in Santiago at 8:30 o'clock Saturday morning. The story became known here in the afternoon and created the greatest excitement. 



THE NATIONAL CAPITOL.

Dimensions of the Building's Various Departments The entire length of the national capitol building from north to south is 751 feet 4 inches, and its greatest dimension from east to west 350 feet. The area covered by the building is 153,119 square feet. The dome of the original central building was constructed of wood. This was replaced in 1856 by the present structure of cast iron. It was completed in 1865. The entire weight of iron used is 8,909,200 pounds. The dome is crowned by a bronze statue of Freedom. It is 19 feet 6 inches and weighs 14,985 pounds. It was modeled by Crawford. The height of the dome above the base line of the east front is 287 feet 5 inches. The height from the top of the balus-trade of the building is 217 feet 11 inches. The greatest diameter at the base 135 feet 5 inches. The rotunda is 95 feet 6 inches in diameter, and its height from the floor to the top of the canopy is 180 feet 3 inches. The senate chamber is 113 feet 3 inches in length by 80 feet 3 inches in width and 36 feet in height. The galleries will accommodate 1,000 persons. The representatives' hall is 139 feet in length by 93 feet in width and 36 feet in height.

illy Weight of Males and Females The average weight of the fant at birth is 7 pounds; that of the fe-

male is not quite 61/2 pounds. The maximum weight (140%) of the male is attained at the age of 40, that of the female (nearly 124 pounds) is not attained until 50, from which ages they both decline in weight, the male to an average of 1271/4 pounds, the female to about 100. The full-grown adult is nearly twenty times as heavy as a new-born infant. In the first year the weight is tripled; afterwards the growth proceeds in goo-metrical progression, so that if 50 in-fants in their first year weigh 1,000 pounds, in the second year they will weigh 1,210 pounds; the third, 1,330 pounds; in the fourth, 1,464 pounds, remaining very constant up to the ages of 11 and 12 in females and 12 and 14 in males, where it must be nearly doubled; afterwards it may be continued and will be found nearly correct up to the ages of 18 and 19, when the growth proceeds very slowly. At an equality of age the male is generally heavier than the female, except towards the age of 12, when the average weight in both sexes is about the same. The male attains the maximum weight at 40, and begins to lose it very sensibly about 60. At 80 he has lost about 13.2328 pounds, the stature having diminished about 2.756 inches. Females obtain their maximum weight at 50. The mean weight of a mature man is 104 pounds; of an average woman 94 pounds. In old age they lose 12 to 14 pounds. The mean weight of both sexes in old age is tha which they had at the age of 19. Children lose weight during the first three days after birth; at the age of 1 week there is a sensible increase; after 1 year they triple their weight; then they require six years to double their weight again, and 13 to quadruple it. At maturity the full-grown man is three and one-half times taller, and weight

20 times more than he did the day of his birth.—St. Louis Republic.
