She Mortally Wounds Her Captain, Hattie Smith, and Kills Herself -Her Motive a Mystery.

HER VICTIM STILL ALIVE.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 16.-The muster of the northwestern division of the Salvation Army at Omaha to meet La then be heard clear above all others Marechale Booth-Clibborn, of France, the voice of the dying girl, who prayed has terminated in a tragedy-sad, sudden and inexplicable. While the bell at the army's headquarters in Omaha was tolling Saturday evening and the oldiers were filing slowly out of the barracks the sound of a pistol shot rang out above the notes of the bell and with a groan one of the army's captains fell to the pavement, blood gushing from her mouth and nestrils. Her body had not yet lodged on the sidewalk when the second report from the pistol was heard and a private reeled from the ranks, and staggering blindly a step or two fell dead in the gutter. It was just er 6 o'clock in the evening and the army's forces had gathered at the bar-racks for the purpose of making its usual parade prior to services.

Motive for the Crime The real motive for the fearful double crime is not so clear as it might be, but the indications point to a rather queer combination of jealousy and semi-re-ligious frenzy. However obscure may be the motive that prompted the deed, its results stand out only too plainly. for the body of Nettie Biedler, the murderess and suicide, rests on a marble alabat the city morgue, and her vic-tim, Capt. Hattse Smith, of the salvation band at Oskaloosa, Ia., in untold agony is awaiting death at her temporary boarding place on Davenport

The murderess came upon her victim as she was standing on the sidewalk conversing with Capt. Wallace from Marshalltown, Is. Without speaking she drew a revolver from beneath the folds of her dress and fired. Almost simultaneously with the crack of the pistol came the shriek of pain from the wounded Capt. Smith and she and Capt. Wallace started to down the street. Evidently fear ing the bullet had not reached a vital apot, the crazed Biedler girl followed her fleeing victim a few steps and fired again. The first bullet evidently went wide of the mark, but when the woman leveled the revolver the wounded captain reeled and fell.

Shot Herself Dead. Without waiting to see the effect of her second shot the woman placed the muzzle of her weapon to her right temple and pressed the trigger a thirdtime. A muffled report, a heavy plunge forward and the body of Nettle Biedler sank lifeless to the gutter.

Smith spoke a few words concerning the deed and its motive. She said she had sought to induce Miss Biedler to join the army white stationed at Council-Bluffs seme thirty days ago. On coming to Omaha Miss Biedler sought her out and with a great show of affection told her she loved her. On several occasions, Miss Biedler sought to occupy the attention of the captain to the exclusion of all others. There was a meeting at the army barracks Saturday afternoon and the Biedler woman seems to have been there, but whether she was there during the entire meeting is not known, as no one noticed her until after the close of the service. At that time she was in the rear portion of the church and sent up word to Capt. Smith that she wanted to talk with her. The latter replied to the messenger that she was busy then and could not grant her the request, but after eating lunch went back and talked to the Biedler woman for some time. What was said by either of them is unknown.

President Harrison Receives Senor Montt's Credentials.

The Latter Says His Mission Is to Preserve Peace Between the Two Coun-tries.—The President Makes a

A CORDIAL MEETING. WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—The United States officially recognized the new congressional government of Chili. The ceremonies incident to recognition occurred in the blue room of the executive mansion at 11:25 o'clock a. m.. Saturday when President Harrison formally received Senor Don Pedro Montt, the new minister of Chili to the United States, and the secretaries of legation.

Senor Montt upon being presented, said his mission was to cultivate and maintain the relations of peace and friendship between the United States and Chili which have ever been close and cordial. For the accomplishment of this purpose he relied upon the kindness and good will which the United States government has always manifested for the representatives of Chili. He expressed Chili's sincere wishes for the prosperity and welfare of this country. which is so highly favored by Providence, and for the president's own hap-

In response President Harrison said: "The presence of a representative of the government of Chiti at the capital we hope will tend to promote a good understanding between the two governments and the early settlement, upon terms just and honorable to both, of the diplomatic enterties both. and honorable to both, of the diplomatic questions now somewhat urgently awaiting adjustment. The government of the United States, as well as the people, particularly desire and rejoice in the prosperity of all its neighbors in this hemisphere. INTERNAL REVENUE.

Extracts from the Annual Report of

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 -The annual LOWELL. report of John W. Mason, commissioner of internal revenue, shows that the total receipts for the last fiscal year from all sources were \$146,045,416, an increase of \$3,440,719 over the receipts for the previous fiscal year. The cost of collection for the last fiscal year was \$4,210,604, or 2.88 per cent. of the receipts, against 2.83 last year. The estimated expenses for the next fiscal year are \$4,522,350. During the year 698 stills were destroyed and ninety-seven were removed, involving the arrest of 378 persons. The aggregate amount of taxes collected from tobacco during the last fiscal year was \$32,793,270. The decrease is \$1,162,723. The tax on eigars and eigarettes was not changed and the collections therefrom was increased \$1,386,650 during the last fiscal year. Tables in regard to the production of oleomargarine show during the year ended June 80, 1891, an increase of production over any former year. but a decrease for exportation. The total production was 44,392,400

pounds. In a chapter on sugar the commissioner details the action of the bureau in providing for the payment of bounty as authorized by the tariff act. The number of sugar producers who have applied for license is 4,906, and their estimated production is 613.376,380 pounds, of which 572,408,380 pounds is sugar cane. The amount of bounty to be paid for the production of the year ending June 30, 1892, will, it is estimated, be as follows: On cane sugar, \$8,912,500; on beet sugar, \$500,000; sorghum sugar, 540,000; maple sugar, \$176,250; total, \$9.628,750. In the last fiscal year we imported 3,483,442,325 pounds of sugar of the value of \$105,-61,431, and produced 512,261,53) pounds. The amount of sugar produced in the United States is about one-eighth of the amount consumed.
