INDIANA MOURNS.

Her Governor, Alvin P. Hovey, Cressas the Dark River.

His Death Occurs at Indianapolis After a Brief Illness-His Career as a Jurist, Soldier and Statesman.

GOV. HOVEY IS DEAD. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 23.-Gen.

Alvin P. Hovey, governor of Indiana, died at 1:20 p. m. He has been ill for first credited. He says there is some time, but it was believed he was a great scarcity of soft coal here improving. His death is a shock to the whole state.



Alvin Peterson Hovey was born in Posey county. Ind., Septem. ber 6, 1821, and, like thousands of others who have attained prominence in American history, his lot in can history, his lot in youth was one of hardship, and giving no hint of the bonors that a strong intellect, fair-GOV. HOVEY. unwearying industry, were to iring him. He studied law and having been admitted to the bar in 1843 when only twenty-two years of age,

entered at once upon what, his youth and sur-roundings considered, was a successful and intrative practice as an attorney. For seven years he devoted himself to his profession, but years he devoted himself to his profession, but in 1839 he was elected a delegate to the convention by which the constitution of Indiana was revised and so greatly did he distinguish himself in that body that in the next year he was chosen circuit judge for the Third judicial district of his state, and after three years' service upon that bench was in 1854 made one of the judges of the su preme court of Indiana. preme court of Indiana.

When the war broke out he instantly cast side his judicial robes and enlisted in the volwhen the war broke out he instantly east saide his jufcicial robes and enlisted in the volunteer service. As early as July, 1881, he was colonel of the Twenty-fourth Indiana infantry. His command at first was employed in Arkanans, where, without any opportunity of becoming distinguished in battle, he so bore thimself that he was promoted to be a brigadier general. Transferred to the army of the Tennessee, just before the opening of the memorable campaign which came to an end on the 4th of July, 1883, in the surrender of Vicksburg, he was assigned to an important command. At the battle of Champion Hills, which was the pivotal one of the brief and brilliant series of engagements by which Gen. Pemberton was forced back with his entire army into Vicksburg. Gen. Hovey so executed the task which fell to his lot that Gen. URGENT APPEALS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—W. P. Rend has returned from the meeting of eastern coal operators and looks upon the local famine in soft coal as more farreaching in its general effects than at first credited. He says there is a great scarcity of soft coal here and elsewhere throughout the northwest. Figuratively speaking, manu-



UNCLE SAM'S ARMY.

Report of Secretary Proctor of Work in His Department.

Preparations for Fortifying All of Our Important Harbors Rapidly Being l'ushed-The Army's Increased Efficiency.

SEA COAST DEFENSES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 .- The annual report of the secretary of war was made public Friday. Mr. Proztor epito-mizes the work of his department as affecte by new legislative and administrative measures as follows:

"In he me of coast defense sites for fortifi-cations have been produced and engineering work has been begun on batteries for mortars and emplacements for guns at New York, Boston, San Funcisco, Hampton Roads and Washington. The morth wing and center section of the gun factory at Watervilet has been completed and is nearly watervilet has been completed and is nearly equi. s.c.l. A couth wing, doubling the capacity, is now being constructed. Provision has already been made for the manufacture by the government of ninety-eight breech-loading steel-rifled guns of high power, and 100 more have been contracted for with private manufacturers. A supply of submarine mines and seventy-three twelve-inch mostars are also un-

der construction. der construction.

"The problem of adequate coast defense has practically been settled. Fortunately it has not been a question of party politics. There has been much discussion and some differences of individual opinion in sespect to the rapidity with which the work should be executed and as regards details. It has been generally recog-nized, however, in congress and by the public press as a national concern—a thoroughly

American policy.

Certain provisions in the lest two fortification acts were designed to influce private mantion acts were designed to innuce private man-ufacturers in this country to cooperate with the government in fabricating guns as well as in supplying the steel forgings. Advan-tageous bids were received and a con-tract made with the Bethlehem Company for supplying twenty-live 8-inch, fity 10-inch and treatts-five 12-inch guns. This contract, and twenty-live 12-inch guns. This contract, and the output of the gun factory from forgings already under contract, provides for the manufacture of 198 breech loading steel rifle guns of high power, sixty two of 8-inch caliber, eighty-six of 10-inch and fifty of 12-inch. Four have been finished, two 8 inch, one 10-inch and one 12-inch; twenty-four more will be finished in 1892 thirty-four in 1893 forty in 1894, when the machinery at the gun factory will be nearly complete. Two batter-ies, each for sixteen 12-inch morturs, and emplacements for two 19-inch, two 10-inch and four 8-inch guns are now in process of construc-tion for the defense of New York: also one battery for sixteen 19-inch mortars and emplreements for one 10-inch gun, with two more a preparation at Boston; and emplacements for two 10-inch guns, with one 10-inch and these 19-inch in preparation at San Francisco; for two 10-inch guns at Hampton Roads, and for the 10-inch guns at Hampton Roads.

"For the improvement of the enlisted force new methods of recruiting have been adopted. lished. These, together with the specific measures undertaken for that purpose, have reduced the percentage of desertions to a lower point than ever before in the history of the army, and in the last year have reduced the 20 per cent.

"There is no longer any doub' that candidates for president and vice president will be in the field before June 1, 1892, nominated by the people's party. It seems to us very plain that the time has come when no influence of the old political organizations and no power of aggregated capital can prevent the hearty and manufactures compine together and congestion of ununimous coming together and cooperation of all the labor forces in the United States, whether employed in the workshop, or in the mine or on the farm.

"This is an important event in the history of the nation and of civilized man. There has been no precedent for it in any of the past ages. The producing classes have hitherto remained imporerished in the midst of the very plenty which they created; those who tolled not have possessed the wealth of the world while those who totied have too often suffered for the necessaries of life. But often suffered for the necessaries of life. But the advance of civilization and universal edu-cation have flooded the minds of the multitude with an ocean of light and taught them the supreme necessity for cooperation in defense of the inborn rights of humanity.

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
