Annual Report of Postmaster General Wanamaker.

The benefits arising from telephonic connections with the post offices will easily suggest them-selves in a hundred ways to these who want the entire people to share in common privileges. Mr. Wanamaker says he believes clerks in post offices, letter carriers, railway postal clerks, fourth-class postmasters and other employes of the department should be fairly paid and ought not to be overworked. words: 'In 1861 the entire revenue of the departm was \$8,349,295 and the expenditures were \$13,606,-759. With 28,585 post offices then, the deficiency was over \$5,251,000, or nearly as much as it was last year. To-day, with reduced postage and more than twice as many post offices and 585 per cent, more miles of mail service and an expenditure of \$72,002,114.55, the department produces all its needs without practically in creasing the deficit before the war. WORK OF A CRANK.

He Demands a Million Dollars from Russell Sage.

Failing in His Mission He Throws a Dynamite Bomb, Blowing Off His Own Head and Killing and Injuring Others.

A DEADLY BOMB.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.-Russell Sage, the millionaire broker, escaped death as by a miracle Friday. The entire Empire building, in which was his office, was shaken to its very foundation by the explosion of a dynamite bomb hurled by a erank, who made a demand upon Mr. Sage for the immediate payment of \$1,250,000, the ultimatum being, in case of refusal, the death of the millionaire, the crank himself and those employed in the office.

Never in the history of the metropolis is it probable that an event has occurred that for the time caused more excitement in Wall street and lower Broadway. Fully 50,000 people were drawn to the scene of the explosion, and for an hour the police were powerless to bring order out of the chaos.

Those who were close at hand saw a man blown through one of the windows of Sage's office into Rector street. A few minutes later Mr. Sage himself, with blood streaming from his face and hands, was helped out into the street and taken to O'Connell's drug store, just below Wall street, on Broadway. There, also, was carried the man blown from the window.

Within ten minutes after the explosion Dr. A. P. Munn, the physician of Jay Gould, was at the side of Mr. Sage and personally attended to his injuries, which proved to be not of a serious nature. The hair and eyebrows of the millionaire were burned and his face and his hands hurt by small particles of glass and plaster, the result of the explosion.

But one person was killed outright, supposed to be H. D. Wilson, the man that made the demand for money from Mr. Sage and the one that threw the bomb. Benjamin F. Morton, who was thrown through the window, a clerk in the office of Mr. Sage, was removed to Chambers street hospital, where he died at 1:30 a. m. while under operation for fracture of the skull. The deceased was a resident of Far Rocka-

THE NEW NAVY.

Tracy, of the navy, says that during the past year four new vessels have been placed in commission, making a total of thirteen since March 4, 1889. as follows: The Ch cago, Yorktown, Petrel, Charleston, Baltimore, Cushing, Vesuvius, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Newark, Concord, Bennington and Miantonomah. Twenty-two vessels

are under construction. The naval militia is discussed and the distribution of the funds provided is noted. The number of men mustered is 1,149 in six states. Of the cost of the navy the amount charged to completed ships, fifteen in number, is \$15,736,354.57. Of the twentyfour uncompleted vessels the expenditure has been \$11,488,794.28, and the total cost when completed will be \$53,920,282-03. The report recommends the consolidation of revenue marine and navy.





Annual Report of Postmaster General Wanamaker.

His Recommendations Regarding One-Cent Postage, Rural Free Delivery, Postal Telegraph, Telephone

UNCLE SAM'S MAILS.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—The postmaster general's annual report, made pub-lic Thursday, shows that in spite of the fact that over \$1,000,000 worth of lottery revenue has been lost during the last year the postal defieit of \$6,000,000 is surely disappearing, provided the same rate revenue and expenses obtains on July 1, 1893. It appears that all of the lottery'mail has practically been driven from the mails, and the fidelity of the department in trying to enforce this almost unanimous wish of congress is

He announces that the extension of 'the merit system of promotion, so successfully put in operation in the department lately, to the large post offices and the railway mail service has already been begun.

The postmaster general recommends the adaptation of the telephone as well as the telegraph to the postal system, showing that it is not only the constitutional privilege but the duty of congress to utilize all the means of modern science for quickening the transmission

of intelligence. He says: "One-cent letter postage, three-cent tele-phone messages and ten-cent telegraph mes-sages are all near possibilities under an en-lightened and compact postal system using the newest telegraphic inventions. The advantage of tying the rural post office by a telephone wire requiring no operator to the raliroad station must be obvious. The benefits arising from telephonic connections with the post offices will easily suggest them selves in a hundred ways to those who want the entire people to share in common privileges. The rural population would be the greatest gainer. A telephone message from the post office to the rail-road static miles away to ascertain if expected freight had come would save the farm-er many a needless trip over bad roads; news of approaching frosts could be promptly spread over country districts and fruit-growing regions and many a valuable crop saved. WORK OF A CRANK.

He Demands a Million Dollars from Russell Sage.

Falling in His Mission He Throws a Dynamite Bomb, Blowing Off His Own Head and Killing and Injuring Others.

A DEADLY BOMB.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.-Russell Sage, the millionaire broker, escaped death as by a miracle Friday. The entire Empire building, in which was his office, was shaken to its very foundation by the explosion of a dynamite bomb hurled by a crank, who made a demand upon Mr. Sage for the immediate payment of \$1,250,000, the ultimatum being, in case of refusal, the death of the millionaire, the crank himself and those employed in the office.

Never in the history of the metropolis is it probable that an event has occurred that for the time caused more excitement in Wall street and lower Broadway. Fully 50,000 people were drawn to the scene of the explosion, and for an hour the police were powerless to bring order out of the chaos.

Those who were close at hand saw a man blown through one of the windows of Sage's office into Rector street. A few minutes later Mr. Sage himself, with blood streaming from his face and hands, was helped out into the street and taken to O'Connell's drug store, just below Wall street, on Broadway. There, also, was arried the man blown from the window.

Within ten minutes after the explosion Dr. A. P. Munn, the physician of Jay Gould, was at the side of Mr. Sage and personally attended to his injuries, which proved to be not of a serious nature. The hair and eyebrows of the millionaire were burned and his face and his hands hurt by small particles of glass and plaster, the result of the

Morton, who was thrown through the window, a clerk in the office of Mr. Sage, was removed to Chambers street hospital, where he died at 1:30 a. m. while under opera-tion for fracture of the skull. Secretary Tracy Reports the Year's Work

in His Department. Washington, Dec. 7 .- In his annual report to the president Secretary Tracy, of the navy, says that during the past year four new vessels have been placed in commission, making a total of thirteen since March 4, 1889, as follows: The Cheago, Yorktown, Petrel, Charleston, Baltimore, Cushing, Vesuvius, Philadelphia, San Francis co, Newark, Concord, Bennington and Miantonomah. Twenty-two vessels

are under construction. The naval militia is discussed and the distribution of the funds provided is noted. The number of men mustered is 1,149 in six states. Of the cost of the navy the amount charged to completed ships, fifteen in number, is \$15,786,854.57. Of the twenty four uncompleted vessels the expenditure has been \$11,488,794.28, and the total cost when completed will be \$53,920,282-03. The report recommends the consolidation of revenue marine

GYPSIES IN THIS COUNTRY. Here and Elsewhere They Preserve Their

Individuality At present there are probably between three and four hundred gypsies in the northern states A few summers ago there was a band of gypsies numbering fifteen or twenty, who pervaded New England and encamped in divers localities. The men were all tinkers. ing pots and kettles; but, unless the farmers of the regions did them great injustice, a propensity to confiscate poultry unlawfully was one of their besetting sins. They conversed together in the guttural gibberish spoken by the tribe everywhere, and different in no respect from their brethren in Spain,

Like the Jews, the gypsies have preserved their individualities in all countries, and are the same, as regards their nomadic instincts, morals and features. as they were in the early part of the fifteenth century. It is popularly supposed that they are of Egyptian descent, but nobody knows of their origin, not even themselves. They are evidently. however, the scions of some eastern stock, and have preserved the oriental peculiarity of laziness unimpaired. We once asked a gypsy woman what region she supposed to be the original habitat of her tribe, to which she replied that they dwelt in Egypt when Mary and Joseph fled from the persecu tions of Herod-and that they closed their doors against the fugitives. A goahead country like the United States is not congenial to them.



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
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
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
