About 2 o'clock Sunday morning Mr. Jennings was aroused by a call from the senator. When he reached the spartment of Mr. Plumb the latter was disrobed and lying on the bed. In response to the inquiry of Mr. Jennings he said: "I have an excru-ciating headache." He was holding his head in his hands and swaving it from side to side. Mr. Jennings immediately called Surgeon General Wales. The doctor gave the patient a hypodermic injection of morphia. The senstor in a few moments became quieter, and, the pain decreasing, he fell into a deep sleep, which continued for some hours.

The Senator's Last Moments. Dr. Wales left about 6:30 o'clock, and jumped up. Mr. Jennings sprang to his assistance. The senator had a vio-lent vomiting spell and was then as-sisted back to his bed. He seemed to be in great agony, tossed his head from side to side on the pillow and exclaimed: "My God, my God, my head!" These were the last words he uttered, for in a few moments he again fell asleep, breathing heavily and laboriously. This sleep lasted until 11:25 o'clock, when his respiration became heavier. and death ensued at 11:49 o'clock.

ONE OF THE FIRST FIGHTS.

Floyd at Carnifex Ferry, Va.

One of the few victories won by the union troops in the early part of the civil war was at the battle of Carnffex Ferry, in Virginia, September 10, 1861. Owing to the strong position occupied by the confederates they were enabled to keep Ben-ham's brigade at bay for some hours inforcements it was growing dusk, and the ground being such that a night attack on the fort was out of the question he ordered his men to form in line of battle and rest upon their arms till the next morning. Had an assault been made as soon as he arrived in the evening the fort could have been taken and Floyd's force captured. During the night the confederates quietly withdrew, leaving behind them their baggage, small arms and munitions of war, and burning the bridge and ferryboats, so that pursuit was impossible. The total casualties amounted to about three hundred killed and wounded .-Chicago News.

Here is the method employed by the hunters of British Columbia who poach upon the sealing grounds: When the schooner sights a seal the little boats are lowered. A hunter armed with two shotguns and a rifle and two sailors to pull the boat take their places and the HOW BOYS AND CIRLS CAN CET ONE hunt begins. The seal may be swimming at the surface, or perchance he is sleeping. The boat is pulled quietly to ward the animal. This is repeated as long as a seal can be seen. In many cases only one or two will be killed during a two days' hunt, while at other time many as twenty will be taken.
