THE ROPE BROKE.

Sr. Louis, March 14.-An accident occurred about 10 a. m. in the boilermaking establishment of Rohan Brothers, corner of Collins and Carr streets, by which three workmen were killed and two boys severely wounded. It appears that the boys had started down from the second story with the large freight elevator, on which was half a ton of iron, and just as the elevator moved the rope broke and platform, iron and boys all rushed down to the floor beneath with a horrible crash. Three Men Killed.

The elevator was a large open concern, and as it fell, three workmen

who were standing under it were caught and crushed beneath the weight and instantly killed. Their names are: Henry Keiser, foreman A Misfore of the sheet-iron department; Frank Conn, boilermaker, and Hugh Duffy. a rigger. The boys, Thomas Flaherty and Michael Sweeney, were flung out of the elevator, and were seriously, if not dangerously, hurt. The fall was about 20 feet.

WASHINGTON, March 9. -Bills were passed in the senate yesterday to pro-hibit the sale of firearms and ammunition to Indians residing upon the reservations, and appropriating \$275,000 for the construction of two United States revenue cutters for service on the great lakes. GHASTLY STORY OF A NECKLACE The Grave of a Persyan Princess Despoiled by American Officers.

The wife of a well-known naval officer, whose home is in Washington, wears about her throat a very beautiful gold necklace, the odd pattern of which has attracted much attention and excited much comment. A great many of her timid friends would be horrified, doubtless, if they knew that for perhaps a century that necklace had adorned the mummy of a Peruvian princess.

Some years ago, says the Philadelphia Press, while a vessel belonging to the United States navy was cruising off the coast of Peru, her officers organized an expedition to dig for mummies. "Inca hunting" has been for many years a favorite pastime in the American navy. Hardly a vessel has gone to the South Atlantic station whose officers have not organized a similar expedition, and many of the graves of the dead rulers of Peru have been opened and despoiled. The expedition which resulted in the discovery of the necklace was most Truitful. Not one, but a dozen graves were found.

In the center was the grave of one who had evidently been a princess, and buried about her in a circle were the remains of those who had been her attendants. The mummy of the princess was in a sitting posture. All of the others were doubled up in the same way, but, while the attitude of the central figure wore the calm aspect of death, the others expressed the most hopeless despair. They had evidently been buried alive and some were in the attitude of tearing their bair or rending their garments. Only the central figure was adorned with ornaments, and chief among these was a necklace of gold beads. LEGENDS OF HAUNTED HILL.

Traditions of Love and Bate That Are Haunted hill, in Frazier, on the road from Springville to Potterville, is an odd-looking mound which is wrapped up in the mysteries of several Indian legends, says the Tulare (Cal.) Times. Some of the traditions were told to us in 1874, when we first visited this region, and ever since we have endeavored to learn the true stories. The Indians are scattered and their legends are difficult to obtain; those possessed of intelligence will not or do not care here many years ago, and who learned to speak in the Indian language, we have gathered the partial narrative of

Two legends are told-one a tale of exclusively of foreign origin. Indian love and jealousy, the other the story of a dreadful and fatal battle between the Tule river Indians and their enemies, the Mexicans residing near

the Indian tongue as "Wailing moun-

San Diego, in this state. Regarding the first tradition but scanty details can be obtained. It is probable the older of the legends and the time of its origin dates back ages ago, and it has been handed down from parent to child among the Tulare Indians for hundreds of years. This much only can be learned: A tribe living on the banks of the Tule east of the hill gave origin to the legend. Among some members of the tribe a bitter jealousy arose, having love for a source. A faction having won the affections of six women, the rivals resolved on sanguinary revenge. Abiding will not burn. Chambers' Journal time and waiting an unguarded hour, they pursued these women to the top of Wailing mountain and murdered them. Every night, the Indians aver, smallest spark in the world would it at last.' In brief, it is this: The Mexi-cans from southern California were wont to make raids into this valley and drive away the ponies of the Indians. Armed with superior weapons, they could defy the Indians. Driven to desperation, the natives resolved to offer battle, and, if possible, drive the ma-rauders from the valley, otherwise to crush them. Learning this, the Mexicans came in larger numbers, prepared for the trial of strength. The opposing forces met in the valley at the base of the hill. The Indians, terrified at the Mexican weapons and the slaughter among their numbers, fled to the top of the hill. There, crouching behind the many rock ledges, they made a last desperate but ineffectual stand. Soon the Mexicans gained the crest, when disorder again prevailed among the Indians, large numbers falling at each volley from their enemy. Only the more cow-ardly escaped, the real warriors dying amid the rock piles, for no quarter was asked or given. It is told that five hundred Indians perished that day at the base and on the summit of this hill, which ever since is known to the Indians as the "Wailing mountain." NOT HEREDITARY.

You May Get Consumption in Various Ways, But Not by Birth. The accumulation of evidence is becoming so great that every physician of experience is forced to share the belief of the communicability of consumption. There are also few physicians who have not had one or more cases that for years they had thought had been contracted in this way, writes Dr. Chappell, in the North American Review. How else than by communication are we to account for the rapid spread of consumption amongst savage nations, where this disease was unknown before civilthe inhabitants of Central Africa and many other countries. Intermarrying or any other condition which might make hereditary transmission a possible cause certainly could not account for its rapid progress. Besides, some of the best observers and investigators believe that consumption is not hereditary, and there is much positive evidence in favor of this view. With such evidence of the possibility of inhaling the bacilli the question would naturally be asked: How do the bacilli get into the atmosphere when they are not found in the breath of sufferers of this disease? We know positively that in these cases bacilli are present in the mucus which is raised after coughing. In its moist condition it is impossible for it to be inhaled, but when it dries and becomes dust it is blown about, and it is in this
