RUIN AND DEATH.

Terrible Havoc Done by the Cyclone in Kansas.

THRIVING CITIES ARE LAID WASTE.

At Wellington, Harper and Other Points nes of Awful Devastation Are Displayed-A Total Loss of Thirty-Three Lives.

WIPED OUT BY WIND.

WELLINGTON, Kan., May 80.-The mighty tornado which formed in Harper county Friday night swept across the counties of Harper and Sumner. To add to the havoc wrought by the twisting storm a water-spout claimed its share of the general wreck and devastated the northern part of Harper county, while lightning added its fires. Trees, barns, farmhouses and whole towns went down before the terrible force of the storm and human life went out in the twinkling of an eye. Fifteen dead at Wellington, seven at Harper and five at Argonia compose the list of victims in the towns, while from the country districts come reports of six killed, making a total of thirty-three

The Wind's Work at Harper. ANTHONY, Kan., May 80 .- The cyclone which swept through the city of Harper Friday night at 7:30 o'clock destroyed many lives, injured a large number of people and did an immense amount of pecuniary damage. The scene in the devastated town is one of ruin and desti-tution. Hardly a building in the entire town escaped demolition, and the place is strewn with debris from end to end. It is almost a miracle that more lives were not lost, as the death list contains now only six names. Many were seriously injured and scores reseived slight wounds. The Victims.

The list of killed is: J. L. Stainham, crushed in the fall of his house; James Harrison; wife and child of James Gallagher, farmer; child of Grant Tomlin; Mrs. Frank Tomlin; William Stevenson, neck broken.

Story of the Storm. Nothing escaped the storm's fury, and great damage is not only done to houses and crops and trees, but thousands of dollars' worth of stock has been killed and injured. It is impossible at present to estimate the entire loss sustained by the city and surrounding country with any degree of accuracy, but men who hav : traveled over its course say that it will not fail far short of \$500,000. Not more than six out of the 800 or 900 residences of the city have escaped damage, but a large majority of them are only slightly hurt. It has been estimated that nearly 150 houses are total wrecks, while as many more are badly damaged. The Harper Mercantile Company's building is a ruin and nearly all its extensive stock of general merchan. Mrs. Barker had presence of mind its extensive stock of general merchaninsurance in the town is light, while in the country it is comparatively nothing. Another serious loss is the new \$14,000 schoolhouse, which is a total and complete wreck from foundation to roof. The storm struck the cemetery and swept down fully two-thirds of the tombstones and monuments, breaking many of them. There is scarcely a residence recognizable as such on Central avenue from the Presbyterian church north. About all the stores in the north half of the city are in ruins and their contents greatly damaged.

Rellef Needed. Many of the people are not only destitute of shelter but of food and clothing as well. A relief committee has been organized. with John Watts as chairman, and Saturday a formal proclamation was issued by the mayor re-piting the distress of the people and calling for aid.

Some Wonderful Escapes Probably the strangest incident of THE ENGINEER DIES AT HIS POST this fearful disaster was the providential and miraculous escape of the 7month-old baby of Frank Bowers, a barber. When the cloud demolished Bowers' house the baby was peacefully sleeping in a cradle beside its mother's bed. The house was torn to fragments, yet the wind kindly and carefully picked up the child out of the cradle, and, with a grasp as tender as that of

its mother, carried it four blocks and



TORNADO AT MEMPHIS.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 30 .- A terrific tornado at 10 o'clock Saturday night swept down the lines of the levees for antles on both sides of the river. A great deal of damage has been done in weakening levees, though up till now no breaks have been reported. As the river has fallen considerably here it is evident that several breaks must have occurred. The damage must prove enormous.

Holding Back the Truth.

The newspaper men here are not sending out truthful reports at all of shood damage for fear of hurting this territory, and the worst that has been sent regarding the lower Mississippi has not been exaggerated. Thousands of dollars' worth of property are being eaten up daily by the encroaching waters. Desha and Chicot counties in Arkansas, that a month ago had a population of 32,000, to-day have one-fifth that remaining. Most of them have moved out never to return. Up in the valleys of the St. Francis, the White and Arkansas rivers the destruction has been simply indescribable, and many poor whites and negroes are in actual destitution. One hundred villages and hamlets in those valleys have been swept away and will never be rebuilt until adequate fortable on Sunday. protection is provided against floods. Arkansas City is entirely flooded by ent least 6 feet of water and there is not dry spot within 2 miles of town. Al brailroad traffic has been stopped, as the Kracks are flooded and business is at a standstill. The waters continue to rise everywhere in the south.

VICKSBURG, Miss., May 80.-When the Protection levee at Gibson's Landing, Ma., broke Saturday two negroes who were riding along behind it were clrowned by the sudden flood which surwounded them. This is the first loss of hife in this territory.

The firemen had hard work saving the remainder of the block because of the scarcity of water, only six hydrants being available. The total works lose \$300,000. 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
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
