

HARRISON WINS.

The Republicans Nominate the President for a Second Term.

Whitelaw Reid, of New York, Named for Vice President—Work Done by the National Convention at Minneapolis.

FIRST DAY'S SESSION. MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 8.—The national republican convention was called to order Tuesday at 12:31 p. m. by J. S. Clarkson, chairman of the national committee.

The session was opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. Brush, chancellor of the University of South Dakota at Mitchell. A moment after the whole convention stood as Dr. Brush, a venerable looking man with a white beard and long white hair, delivered the invocation.

H. de Young, of California, stepped forward and read the call for the convention, after which Chairman Clarkson arose and announced that he was instructed by the committee to present to the convention for its temporary chairman J. S. Fessenden, of New York.

Upon taking the chair Mr. Fessenden began his address with complimentary references to the convention whose duty it was, he said, to formulate, for the inspection of the people, the distinctly upon what they call a tariff reform issue, with two-thirds majority in the house, and with a two-thirds majority in the senate, and with a two-thirds majority in the supreme court.

Mr. Fessenden completed his speech at 1:09 o'clock p. m. and took the rail in his left hand before the convention moved to the hall and immediately the convention was on its feet shouting and waving hats. Mr. Reid shook his head in response to the continued calling. But the convention would not be satisfied without him.

Mr. Reid continued until Mr. Reid, rising, his straw hat in his hand, picked his way to the side and walked down to the chairman's platform. He spoke briefly, praising the party for its achievements in the past and congratulating it on its prospects for the future.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 9.—The republican national convention met at 11 o'clock yesterday morning and the report of the committee naming Gov. McKinley, of Ohio, as permanent chairman, was ratified. Upon taking the chair Mr. McKinley said:

Republican conventions say what they mean and mean what they say. They declare principles and policies and purposes, and when intrusted with power they execute and enforce them.

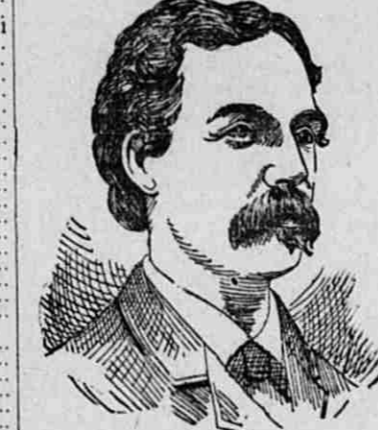
