HARRISON WINS.

The Republicans Nominate the President for a Second Term.

Whitelaw Reid, of New York, Named for Vice President-Work Done by the National Convention at Minueapolis.

FIRST DAY'S SESSION.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 8.-The national republican convention was called to order Tues-day at 12:31 p. m. by J. S. Clarkson, chairman of the national committee. The delegates were all in their seats, and the parts of the great hall devoted to spectators were crowded to suf-focation. When the chairman's gavel fell Mr. Clarkson announced that the session would be opened with prayer by Rev. Dr Brush, chancel-bor of the University of South Dakota at Mitchell. A moment after the whole convention stood as Dr. Brush, a venerable looking man with sparsely covered head and long white beard,

delivered the invocation. The session was opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. Brush, chancellor of the University of South Dakota. Then M. H. de Young, of California, stepped forward and read the call for the con-vention, after which Chairman Clarkson arose and announced that he was instructed by the and announced that he was instructed by the committee to present to the convention for its temporary chairman J. Sloat Fassett, of New York. There was a round of applause as Mr. Passett went forward to the platform. distinctively upon what they call a tariff reform issue, with two-thirds majority in the house, and what do you find? That they have passed three bills. Let me name them: First, free tin and steel or iron plates on which tin is coated taxed, the finished prod-uct free and the raw material bearing duty. Second, free wool to the manu-facturer and tariff cloth to the consumer. Third, free cotton sites and Third, free cotton ties to the cotton states and tarifi hoop iron to all the rest of the states. That is their symbol of tarifi reform. Gentie-men of the convention, how do you like it?

"This contest that you enter upon is for the maintenance of protection and reciprocity. But I want to say here that there is not a line of that tariff bill that is not American; there is not a paragraph that is not patriotic; there is not a page that does not represent true Americanism and the highest possibilities of American citizenship (Applause) We are to declare ourselves upon other questions here to-day. We are to declare ourselves upon the question of a free ballot and a fair count [Applause.] No platform should ever be made by a re-publican convention that did not reiterate that reset constitutional guaranty. No repubgreat constitutional guaranty. No repub-lican speech should ever be made that did not lican speech should ever be made that did not insist-finally and resolutely insist-that that great constitutional guaranty shall be a living birthright, not the cold formality of con-stitutional enactment, but a living thing, which the poorest and hum-blest may confidently enjoy and which the highest and most powerful dare not deny. [Great applause.] We can well have to the committee on resolutions the duty of making a platform that shall represent the best thoughts and the best ideas and the best wisdom of the republican party. [Applause.] When we go out of this convention upon a true republican platform we go marching to victory, no matter what name we may carry on our banner." [Ap-plause.]

GOT THE COIN.

Bold Thieves Relieve a California Paymaster.

Two Men Rob Another of Two Bags Containing \$16,000 and Make heir Escape.

HOW IT WAS DONE.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13 .- The boldest robbery ever committed in this vicinity occurred Saturday morning scross the bay in Oakland, when two men in a crowded car were robbed of \$16,000 in coin, which they were taking to the Judson iron works to pay off 400 workmen.

The coin was in the possession of Secretary Gilson and Bookkeeper Mortensen, of the company, who started with it from San Francisco on the 11 o'clock boat. As the train showed up at B street two men entered the front door, walked down the sisle, stopped suddenly before Gilson a d Mortensen, and presented pistols an i demanded the money bags. "Hold Ly your hands," was the order, and Gilson and Mortensen had no option but to obey. "Now hand over that money." cont nued the leader.

Gilson surrendered the bag of silver (there were two, one containing \$1,000 in silver and the other \$15,000 in go d), dropping the other between the seats, hoping to elude the vigilance of the rob-

ber. "None of that," said the robber, cocking his revolver, "Hand over the other bag," and Gilson passed it up. Surprised by the Robbers.

Gilson and Mortensen had thrown over a seat in front of them and laid the sacks containing the coin on a seat efore them. The two men occu one seat and the coin was perhaps 2 feet from them. Gilson was reading a newspaper and was taken completely by surprise! Simultaneously with the demand for the coin the train started, and the two robbers backed out of the car with the money, covering Gilson and Mortensen with their pistols as they escaped. Pandemonium immediately reigned in the car. Everyone seemed to lose his head. It was so sudden that the thirty or more passengers in the car had hardly realized what had taken place before the robbers were in possession of the money and were making their escape. Any attempt to recover the money at the time would have been fatal for the robbers were shrewd enough to keep the passengers covered with their revolvers until they reached the car door. Gilson went out on the platform and emptied his revolver at the fleeing robbers. One passenger said that the smaller of the robbers staggered after the firing, but this part of the story was unconfirmed. The robbers had provided themselves with a horse and buggy with which to escape, and they drove rapidly away. Wore Bullet-Proof Armor. The buggy in which they drove away after committing the robbery has been found. In it were two breast plates made of boiler iron formed to fit over the breast and two inflated rubber bags, such as baseball catchers wear to protect the abdomen. The robbers were thus made bullet proof. In the buggy were also found the clothes which the men wore on the train. They had been hurriedly ripped off with a sharp knife. Reward Offered. The police think they have a clew to of \$1,000 for the capture of J. G. Smith and Joe Dunn, formerly employes of the Judson company, but who left some time ago of their own accord. The police refuse to give their reasons for suspecting these men. The robbers have been traced to the foothills of Mount Diablo, 15 miles from Oakland, where it is thought they buried the money, and one remained there to guard the treasure while the others returned to Oakland with the horse and buggy. Another man suspected is a discharged employe named Girard, who is also known as Frank Queen, an ex-criminal.



stood (according to skeletons which Bemus caught a brook trout which have been found in guano beds) within eggs, specimens of which are now in quarters ounces, had thirteen rattles on existence, which were as large as a twohis tail and held in his mouth a tract gallon jug and had a holding capacity as great as one hundred and forty-eight good-sized hen's eggs! The giant mon,

which did not become extinct until after Capt. Cook's visit to New Zealand, was larger, in point of weight and bulk at least, than Sinbad's roe. The was so clumsy that Cook's sailors had no difficulty in killing several of them with hand spikes which were used about the ship. The great auk, an-other species of birds now extinct, was fabulous sum of money now asked and given for specimens of its eggs. In the year 1889 an egg of the great auk sold in London for \$1,225.
