Didn't Know Their Danger.

on the Normannia. The 1,000 odd passengers were kept in densest ignorance of the true state of affairs during the entire voyage. They were told that the deaths which had occurred were from natural causes. Saturday and early Sunday morning they were laughing and joking at the mischance which detained them in quarantine and sure of being shortly released. Sunday noon they learned better. It Was a Pitiable Scene.

The scene that transpired is indescribable. Women were crying and wailing, men were cursing and all were terror-stricken. One passenger offered the health officers \$2,000 in cash to take him ashore. Others frantically laid their entire fortunes at the feet of the visitors and begged that they be allowed to hide in the boat on the return trip. The health officers were overcome by the pitiable scene and so far have proved of such efficiency made haste to depart.

Cremating the Dead.

The crematory retort on Swinburne island has been kept at a white heat night and day since the first pest ship, the Moravia, arrived. At midnight Saturday night it received its first dead, the three who died Saturday. Under the direction of Dr. Byron the bodies were placed on the long iron trays and shoved into the flames. They were "cholera corpses," their skins dry as parchment, eyes deeply sunken, faces livid with the bluish black hue due to the disappearance of the fluid matter in the blood, leaving only the ultra marine pigment. Surely Cholera, But May Be Killed. Dr. John M. Byron, the bacteriologist, who is in charge of the bacilli culture experiments of the cholera patients on Swinburne island, has been coming and going between lower quarantine and the city every day since the arrival of the Moravia, cholera should be stamped out in the lower bay in five or six weeks, without reaching the city at all. Immigration will stop entirely very soon because of the governmental circular announcing a twenty days' detention of all immigrant ships. That will leave only a limited number of vessels to deal with. BANGOR, Me., Sept. 5.-Mr. Blaine has recently expressed to a friend his views of the clear duty of the government in the matter of the cholera danger. An attempt was made to secure a complete interview with him on the subject, but it partially failed, owing to the arrival from New York at the Bar Harbor residence of Walter Damrosch, the son-in-law of Mr. Blaine. Mr. Blaine said at the time of the seizure of the fishing schooner Adams, just after Mr. Cleveland became president, that his foreign policy in all things was thought to be a strong one, and that he ought not to express himself before the president had a chance to act. But this time, he says, the duty is clear and the path plain. In substance it is to close traffic between the old world, Canada and the United States to everybody and everything save the mails and citizens of this country now abroad, and to admit these only after perfect precantion. His idea is that there are not and cannot be commercial relations which for a moment are to be considered in comparison to safety of life. He has always held this country to be dependent on no other, save for some of the luxuries of life, and he thinks while we may lose and may cause loss in some quarters, such matters can be easily adjusted. He wants everything now on the water on the way from the old world kept from the land, and a discontinuance of all foreign railroad traffic across the states. The Chief Executive Speaks at OWELL, - MICH

The Powers of the Government in Cases of Pestilence Portrayed-The Duty of the States In Peril-

ous Times. HARRISON ON CHOLERA. PLATTSBURG, N. Y., Sept. 5 .- Presi dent Harrison and party arrived herefrom Washington at 12:30 p. m., Saturday. A large crowd with the city band were at the depot upon the arrival of the train. The party was escorted to the Fouquet house, where an elaborate dinner had been prepared. The president made a short speech from the second balcony of the hotel

In his address the president said: said: "So great has been that development which has come under the blessing of God, and so great the power of our people that we do not stand in fear of men. Secure in our own con-sciousness that peaceful disposition toward all has model and cause is the muchts multiary the world and secure in the mighty military strength which is found in the courageous hearts and strong arms of her people the nation rearis and strong arms of her people the hardon goes on upon peaceful lines in peaceful pur-suits, the care of the home education of the children and the worship of God each in his own way. The policy of our government has been to leave to the states the exer-cise of these powers of quarantine to keep out the disease. The national government has the duty of hearty co-operation. I felt that the extreme sug riendly spirit I felt that the extreme sou gestion of convening an extra session of con-gress with a view to resuming to the national government these powers was not in thi-emergency the best. Time would be consumed in securing the necessar-legislation and much more time in the prop-equipment of quarantine agencies in all ou-ports. It seemed therefore that it would be ports. It seemed, therefore, that it would be serve the public interest and protect the hom-of my fellow citizens to promptly cooperat

with the state authorities and to exercise those powers already conferred by the law. Fo performing this plain duty I deserve no man thanks. "I deprecate any unnecessary alarm. Alarm

commendable, but alarm that becomes terror or panic is unwholesome. Doing all that can b done to let business and social duties procee without interruption, let us leave the issue of life with the benign God who conferred it."



It is true that disinfectants are having a large sale and that people are cleaning their houses, and looking to their frainage with more than the usual care, but this is not done with any feeling of alarm, but simply as a matter of proper precaution. The weather here for days past has been delightfully bracing, and this has a great share in calming the public mind and in leading everybody to hope that the cholera cloud will not hover over New York bay for any great length of time.
