HIS LIFE ENDED.

M. Erneste Renan Passes Away in Paris.

The Eminent French Philosopher Expires After a Brief Illness-Sketch of His Career.

M. RENAN IS DEAD.

Paris, Oct. 3. - Joseph Erneste Renan, the distinguished philologist and author, whose serious illness was announced Saturday, died at an early hour Sunday, after enduring intense suffering. The ailment which resulted in M. Renan's death was contracted Tuesday last. On that day he went driving and caught a severe cold. which speedily developed into congestion of the lungs. He was alled to the lungs. He was slighly better Saturday morning, and his friends took hope that he would rally and recover from the disease with which he had been prostrated. They were doomed to deep disappointment, however, as toward evening his legs and stomach began to swell, and he suffered great agony. His condition necessitated a painful operation which had the effect of weakening the patient's vitality. After the operation had been performed M. Renan fell into a state of heavy somnolence from which he never rallied. He continued to grow weaker and weaker, and died at 6:20 o'clock Sunday morn-

[Joseph Erneste Renan, philosopher and historian, was born at, Tregnier, Cotes-du-Nord February 27, 1823. His parents wished him to enter the priesthood, and at an early age he was sent to Paris to obtain his preparation. At the close of his classical studies he was placed in the seminary of St. Sulticete to complete his theological course. While there he showed remarkable aptitude in the study of the Hebrew, Arabic and Syriac languages. He had already developed, however, too much independence of thought to qualify for the priesthood, and therefore he quitted the seminary to follow the bent of his own mind. In 1847 he won the Volney prize for a week upon the Semitic language. In a work upon the Semitic language. In 1851 he was attached to the department of manuscript in the national library, and five years later was elected a member of the Academie des Inscriptions in the place of M. Augustin Thierry. In 1800 he went on a mis-Augustin Thierry. In 1800 he went on a mission to Syria, and three years later published his "Life of Jesus." M. Renan beckme a member of the French Academy on June 18, 1878. Renan's wife was the daughter of Henri Scheffer, the painter. Renan wrote voluminously. Among his works are studies in religious history, the "Book of Job," "Philosophical Dialogues and Fragments," "Spinoza," "History of the Origin of Christianiy," begun in 1803 and completed in seven volumes in 1882; "The Evanpleted in seven volumes in 1882; "The Evan-gelists," "The Apostles," and "Marcus Aureli-us." Dr. Douglass, Who Attended Gen. Grant During His Last Illness, Passes Away at

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.-Dr. John H. Douglass, who attended Gen. Grant during the latter's last and fatal nine months' illness, died here Sunday morning. Dr. Douglass at the time he was was one of the most prosperous physicians in New York. He was devoted to Grant, having served with him almost constantly for three years of the late war. During the general's last hours no one was more constantly at his bedside and no one did more to relieve his suffering than Dr. Douglass. It was this that ruined the doctor physically and financially. During the nine months he devoted to Grant Douglass' practice had gone to others, and soon after his health failed him completely. His sickness was undoubtedly traceable to his long service at Grant's

UNDER FALLEN ROCK.

Great Mass of Stone Falls in a Michigan Mine-Eleven Workmen Buried-One Is Rescued Alive-Four Dead Bodies Recovered-The Rest Not Yet Found. ISHPEMING, Mich., Sept. 80 .- At 5

Strikers at Homestead, Pa. Charged with Treason.

The Supreme Court Issues Warrants for the Arrest of the Leaders Under the Charge of Their Being Traitors to the State.

FIRST OF THE KIND.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Oct. 1. - The supreme court of Pennsylvania assembled here Friday for the October term and its first act was to issue warrants for the arrest of the members of the advisory committee of the Homestead strikers on the charge of treason for setting up in defiance of the constituted authority of the state a traitorous and rebellious government of its own in Homestead in July last. The information was made before Chief Justice Paxton by County Detective Harry Beltzhoover in the name of the commonwealth against the following per-

fendants. WARRANTS ISSUED.

Chief Justice Paxton at once issued warrants for the arrest of the accused and officers were dispatched by the sheriff to Homestead to serve them. The action of the county authorities was entirely unexpected and carried consternation into the camp of the strikers. This is the first time in the history of the state that any resident has been charged with treason against the commonwealth and the outcome of the cases will be watched with interest. The penalty, which was formerly death, is twelve years' imprisonment in the penitentiary.
