Wreck of a Santa Fe Express Train Near Colorado Springs-Twenty-One Passergers Injured, Two of Whom Will Die.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Dec. 24.- The Chicago express on the Santa Fe road was derailed about 2 miles east of Halstead, Col., while running at a high rate of speed. The passenger coaches and Puliman sleeping cars were hurled down an embankment 50 feet high to the bottom, landing in a heap. The overturned cars immediately caught fire, and it was with the greatest difficulty the imprisoned passengers were rescued from a frightful death. A number of passengers and several of the train crew are reported injured, but no one was killed. THE WORLD'S FAIR.

How the Great Exposition Will Be Formally Opened.

The Only Address Will Be Made by Grover Cleveland, Who Will Also Set the Wheels in Motion-Other Plans Outlined.

OPENING DAY.

CHICAGO, Dec. 23.-The programme for opening the exposition next May has been completed by the committee having the matter in charge. Grover Cleveland, who will be president of the United States when the fair is opened, is to deliver the only address and start the machinery. No other orator will be heard. A poem, perhaps, by Oliver Wendell Holmes, and some music will precede Mr. Cleveland's address. After the wheels are buzzing and the crowds are rushing through the buildings it is proposed that President Cleveland and his party shall drive through the grounds and pay their re-spects to foreign commissioners to the fair, who will be waiting in the official headquarters to receive the presidential party. Later in the evening Mr. Cleveland's carriage will stop in front of festival hall, and there the president will hold a public reception for two hours, from 4 to 6 o'clock.

The public will not have an opportunity to attend the exercises of formally inaugurating the great exposition. Festival hall seats but 5,000 persons. One thousand tickets will be reserved for officials of the fair, members of congress and others. The remaining 4,000 seats will be sold at five dollars each, tickets being issued on invitation. FOR A BIG CONGRESS.

Archbishop Feehan Summons Catholies to Gather in Chicago Next Year-Subjects for Discussion.

CHICAGO, Dec. 26.-The official call for the Columbian Catholic congress of the United States, which will assemble in this city September 4, 1893, at 11 o'clock a. m., has been issued. The call is signed by Archbishop Feehan, the charman of the committee on arrangements, and William J. Onahan, the secretary. The congress will be under the honorary presidency of his Eminence Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop of Baltimore. The introduction to the call is devoted to a discussion of the worthy objects of the Columbian exposition, and it is stated that Pope Leo XIII. has in the most signal manner given proofs of the warm interest he feels in the fair and its various distinetive features.
