Over 100 shots were exchanged, but fortunately no one was injured. The mine has been in partial operation with colored men for several weeks and the strikers have become discouraged. averted for a time at least. After a consultation lasting from 9 o'clock to 12:30 Gov. Lewelling signed the peace agreement with the republican house of representatives. By its terms the militia companies are to be sent home at once and the sheriff is to discharge all of his deputies. The republicans are to be left in full and undisputed possession of repre-sentative hall, and the populist house is to hold sessions in a room outside of the capitol building. By the terms of the agreement neither house is to interfere with the proceedings of the other. 

Senate.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.-The senate on Saturday afternoon passed-by a vote of \$0 to 16-Senator Sherman's amendment to the sundry civil bill. It authorizes the secretary of the treasury, at his discretion, to issue 8 per. cent five year bonds to an amount not exceeding \$50,000,000, in order to recover gold to the treasury. Senator Mills' amendment to make the bonds redeemable at the pleasure of the United States was defeated; as also was one offered by Senator Stewart providing that the bonds shall not be deposited as a basis for national bank issues.
