As he entered the house he found everything hushed as if the place had been deserted. He rushed upstairs to the room where his sister Florence lay in her sickbed, and found her lying across the bed. Blood had poured from a wound just above her ear. Mr. Force ran downstairs to the sitting room, where he found the body of his other sister, Minnie. Her body was lying near the door of the room and blood was oozing from a hole in her right temple.

Mr. Force sent his brother for physicians and then started to look for Julia. In her room, which is just in front of that in which the dead body of Minnie was discovered, he found a small pistol on the floor with two of its chambers empty. As soon as the officers arrived Mr. Force begged them to go and find Julia, saying that his two sons were at the store and she would kill them too. The policemen assured him that Julia was already un-
