Sweet of Grana Rapids: vice-president, C. J. Church of Greenville; secretary, O. C. McDannell, M. D., of Lowell; treasurer, Charles A. Church of Lowell. The power plant of the company is lo-cated on Flat river about one-half mile north of the village. The company has perfected one of the best dams in the state at this point and has placed machinery in position for generating elec-tricity for distributing light and power brough the city. 'the plant is provided with every possible appliance which will subserve the complete and economical atilization of all the power of Fiat river. Already there are in place powerful Edison generators for power purposes, and T. H. arc lights and alternators for lighting purposes. The

WOE IN SAGINAW.

Are Homeless.

A SCENE OF BUIN

SAGINAW, May 22 .- Saturday after- A. J. BOWNE, noon the metropolis of the Saginaw valley was visited by the worst conflagration in her history and one of the most destructive which ever visited city in the state. The loss amount to about \$1,500,000. total insurance will aggre-about \$600,000. The extent of territory which was burned is about thirty squares, and includes large portions of the Sixth and Seventh wards. This territory was swept nearly clean of every building. A close estimate places the number of buildings destroyed at 275. Over 200 families are homeless and 800 men are thrown out of employment.

The first alarm was turned in at 3:45 o'clock from box 52. The department was called to the mill of Sample & Camp on what is termed the "middle ground," south of Bristol street and on the east side of the river. Just how the fire started is not certain, but it is supposed it caught from sparks, possibly from a passing tug boat. This build-ing was not occupied and the loss was a few hundred dollars.

A strong gale from the southwest drove the flames to 700,000 feet of lumber owned by Brown & Ryan. The sparks from this set fire to the eastern span of the Bristol street bridge, burning it down and cutting off street railway communication. From the bridge thence the flames leaped to the east side, just below Bristol street and north of the city hall, where were located a large number of buildings, including hose house No. 6, J. F. Winkler's ice houses, all residences on Tilden street, and on both sides of Washington avenue down to Holden street. These were quickly licked up.

Then the sparks were carried across the old bayon into the premises of the George F. Cross Lumber company, the Planing-Mill Lumber company, the yard and a dozen tenement houses melting like snow. Next came the Al-lington & Curtis Manufacturing company's extensive plant and Passolt's soap factory, all of which were wiped out. Here the fire struck Jefferson avenue, and in an hour some of the finest residences in the city were in ashes, and dispatch. the sweep being north to Emerson street, where the fire continued castward south of and along Emerson street out toward-the city limits. It cut a wide swath on Owen, Howard, Sheridan and Warren avenues and other streets east. St. Vincent's orphans' home succambed early, but the inmates were all removed to places of safety.
