THE STORY IS TOLD.

Full Reports of the Awful Disaster in Louisiana.

The Number of Deaths Increased - The Property Loss Is Nearly 85,000,000 -Thousands of Sufferers in Need of Aid.

A PITIFUL TALE.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 9.-The full story of the great storm is now told. Every settlement along its path has been visited and every survivor interviewed. Each has told his tale of its terrors and the heroism it brought out. Newspapers here are at last able to publish a list of the dead which is not likely to require many changes or addi-tions. The only doubtful elements are the loss of life at Cheniere Caminada, where 776 bodies have been recovered and buried. Father Gondreaux, the parish priest, has furnished a list of 822 known to be dead. The estimates of the loss run from this figure to 1,200 for the Cheniere proper and 1,800 for the whole district. Many Children Perlahed.

Of the 829 dead at Cheniere Caminada hose names are known 496 were children. The Caminada people are famous for large families. Mr. Lafon lost his wife and fifteen children, August Bona-

mour his wife and ten children and Aisere Petre his wife and ten children.

The families of the three Valence sions numbered 718,646. This included brothers, who lived together-John, Aulome and Perie—consisted of six grown persons and twenty children. Of these twenty-six only one-John Valence-survived.

Many Are Missing.

In the Bayou Cook section the number of bodies recovered have been 131, as follows; In Bayou Cook, thirtyseven; Bayon Shute, thirty-seven; Grand bayon, twenty-six; Bayon Ferrand, seven; Bayon Chalard, one; Cypress bay, sixteen, and at Tropical bend, on the Mississippi river, 18 miles distant, where they floated from the swamp, seventeen. There are 183 other persons still missing, who have not been seen since the storm. Their bodies are supposed to be lying in the swamps or were swept to sea. This makes the total loss in the Bayon Cook county \$14, twothirds of whom are Austrians from Dal-

CHICAGO, Oct. 10 .- It was an ideal day for the observance of Chicago day at the world's fair grounds. From morning until night not a cloud appeared in the sky. TRADE OUTLOOK.

Signs of Business Improvement Are Difficult to Detect.

Trade Orders Too Small to Keep Working Forces Employed - Stock Markets Are Weak-Record of Fallures in Six Months.

THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK. NEW YORK, Oct. 9.-R. G. Dun

Co.'s weekly review of trade says: and the number of hands at work during the last week, it is becoming painfully clear that the orders obtained do not suffice to keep employed at full time even the limited force at present engaged. The business transacted is still far below that of last year in volume, in rallroad earnings the decrease being in 5 per cent. In spite of large world's fair business, and in payments through the principal clearing houses outside New York the decrease is 25 per cent.

Reports from other cities disclose a distinct check in business. There is on the whole less activity and less confidence regarding the fu activity and less confidence regarding the fix ture than there was a week ago. While the volume of all kinds of money in virtuation has increased \$21,377,247 during the month of Sep-tember, and is now greater by almost \$0,000. 600 than it was last year, the embarrassment is now, as it has been all the time, due to a lack of confidence rather than to a lack of currency.

Industrial Improvement Slow. Industrial Improvement Slow.

There is not such encouragement as might be desired in the industrial reports for the week. In almost every department orders are found too small to keep the restricted working force fully employed. Many concerns are working short time, while the general reduction in wages also affects the purchasing power of the millions who still have work. As increased number of establishments is reported in operation, but the sagging of prices in print cloths and some other cotton goods, and in the most important products of iron and steel, discloses greatly discarded business.

Demand for Products. Demand for Products is on the whole less satisfactory than it was a week ago. Steel billets are seiling at Pittsburgh for 818 per ton and there is practically no demand for rails. In manufactures of wool there is still remarkable hesitation and the demand for consumption is much restricted, so that the purchases of wool at the principal markets, natwithstanding some anceutative burge, have notwithstanding some speculative buying, have been only 2,825,996 pounds, against 6,272,490 for the same week last year.

The Stock Market. The markets for stocks and products have been comparatively dull. In stocks prices have gradually yielded, although but little, and are now but a small fraction lower than a week ago. The trading has not been large, excepting the industrial stocks, and few of these have been active except in dealings between few traders.

In the Cities.

At the west rather more activity is reported at several cities, notably Chicago, St. Louis, Cieveland, Duluth, St. Paul and Kansas City. Lumber is generally higher in price. The demand for cattle and hogs has also improved. From the east reports are less favorable, except from Baltimore, where increased sales are reported. The dry goods demand is below the average at Boston and Philadelphia.

Statistics of Failures.

Failures continue to decrease in numbers and importance, though not as much as has been hoped. The number reported in the United States during the last week has been 200, against 184 for the same week last year, and in Canada 45, against 30 iast year. During the first half of the year the failures were in amount of liabilities \$168.200 830, so that the aggregate, not including banking and financial failures, has been not more than \$251,340,879.

A BIG THEFT.

SWEPT BY WIND.

Death and Destruction Follow a Storm in Arkansas.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 9 -A terrific wind and rain storm swept over Arkansas Thursday night, leaving death and destruction in its path. In Union county, in the southwestern part of the state, several houses were blown down, four women were killed outright, and several persons were seriously injured. The town of Eldorado was badly damaged, but no report of loss of life has been Faulkner county, the storm was quite severe, and blew over a number of houses, killing two persons. Along the Arkansas river, a few miles east of Conway, in the vicinity of Bristol, damage to houses. Bristol, damage to houses, fences, and barns is reported. There was no loss of life. The storm raged in Little Rock for half an hour, the wind blowing at the rate of 50 miles an hour. Several buildings were damaged, but no casualties occurred.

DISASTROUS FIRE.

Twenty-Six Business Houses Destroyed at Parkersburg, In.

WATERLOO, In , Oct. 10 .- Fire started Monday morning in the business portion of the town of Parkersburg, 25 miles west of this city. The town has no fire protection and the fire was soon beyond control. Waterloo sent help, which succeeded in getting the flames under control after twenty-six business houses were destroyed. The buildings that were destroyed were mostly frame structures, though there were three or four brick blocks among them. The loss is estimated at about \$175,000, with insurance from \$50,000 to \$75,000. It is believed the fire was of incendiary origin, as several of the losers state that they were recently advised privately to increase their insur-




