Railroad Disasters. The loss of life by railroad disasters in 189 was 4,800, as compared with 4,428 in 1803, 3,23 in 1891 and 3,420 in 1890. The number of serieusly injured was 4,804, as compared with 3,833 in 1802, 3,707 in 1891 and 2,740 in 1890.

It is remarkable in this connection that physicians not only continue to head the list of professional person who have taken their own lives but that the number is on the increase year by Bional person who have taken their own lives but that the number is on the increase year by year. In 1891 there were 23 physicians and 12 elergymen; in 1892, 37 physicians and 11 clergy-men; while in 1893 there were 85 physicians and but 8 clergymen. The causes of suicide were

TRADE REVIEW.

A Dismal Record Left by the Year Just Closed.

The Year, Which Opened with Bright Prospects, Was More Fruitful in Commercial Disasters Than for Over Fitty Years.

THOUSANDS OF FAILURES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.- R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says: Starting with the largest trade ever known, mills crowded with work, and all business stim millis crowded with work, and all business stimulated by high hopes, the year 1893 has proved, in sudden shrinkage of trade, in commercial disasters and depression of industries, the worst for fifty years. Whether the final results of the panic of 1837 were relatively more severe the scanty records of that time do not clearly show. The year closes with prices of many products the lowest ever known, with millions of workers seeking in vain for work, and with charity laboring to keep back suffering and starvation in all our the prince of Wales and nearly all the keep back suffering and starvation in all our cities. All hope the new year may bring brighter days, but the dying year leaves only a dismal record. The review of different departments of trade given exhibits a collapse of industry and business which is almost without precedent. The iron industry sustained a weekly production of 181,651 tons pig May 1, but by October 1 the output had fallen to 78,895 tons, and the recovery to about 100,000 December 1 still leaves 40 per cent, of the force unemployed. Over half the woolen mankeep back suffering and starvation in all our force unemployed. Over half the woolen man-ufacture is idle, and, excepting a brief recovery in November, has been ever since new wool in May, for all sales at the three chief markets in the eight months have been but 106,705,400 pounds, partly for specu-lation, the price having fallen 20 per cent for flaces, to the lowest point were known, against fleece to the lowest point ever known, against 212,339,008 pounds in the same mouth last year. Where the Farmer Suffered.

Purchases for consemption shrunk so much, so many hands were out of work or earning reduced wages, and business of all kinds was so reduced that the circulation of idle money become the greatest ever known, exceeding \$200,000,000 in New York.
