BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

Evidences of Increasing Activity in Various Industries.

The Gain Is More Definite Than One Week Ago-Produce Markets Con-tinue Dull-The Record of Failures.

SIGNS OF BETTER TIMES. NEW YORK, Jan. 27.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says:

Co,'s weekly review of trade says: "Secretary Carlisle's decision to issue bonds and the early reports of large bids for them helped to accelerate recovery of industries and trade, as was hoped last week. Sale of the amount offered will check anticity about the maintenance of note redemption, remove the only pretext for further issues of paper and thus give a solid basis for greater confidence regarding the financial futurs. The revenue is still small-from costumes in January thus far \$10,805,601, against \$19,985.785 last year, and from internal taxes \$4,87,979, against \$11,008,408 -and the volume of domestic trade is still small.

"The increase in the number of hands em-"The increase in the number of hands em-ployed adds to the purchasing power of the people, and dealers' stocks are so reduced that any sign of larger consumption quickly gives mills more orders. In short, the conditions are such that, if not interrupted by adverse forces, they would naturally bring a steady revival of business.

"Failures in the United States were 430 this week, against 25 last year, and 55 in Canada against 40 last year. None are of great magni-tude. The liabilities of the firms falling thus far reported this year amount to 13,268,969, of which 16,072.8.7 were manufacturing and 16,800,-353 of trading concerns."

THE CURTAIN FALLS. Death of Rosina Vokes, the Well-Known English Actress.

LONDON, Jan. 30 .- Rosina Vokes, the well-known English actress, died at Torquay, Devonshire, on Saturday. few months ago she was compelled by ill-health, while making a tour of the United States, to break up her company. She returned to England in the hope that her health would be benefited, but her hopes were not realized. Consumption made its appearance about fifteen months ago and from that

time she declined rapidly. Her death was painless. Her husband and a number of relatives were present when she breathed her last.

Mrs. Cecil Clay, better known to the Amer-tean and British public as Restni _Vokes, although her actual maiden name was Theodosia Vokes, was one of "The Vokes Family," which in 1841 was called "The Vokes Children," and made its debut at the Operetta house in Edinburgh. The company consisted of Fawden, Frederick, Mortimer, Jessie, Victoria and Rosina. The success of that combination is a wall known that it is that combination is so well known that it is unnecessary to enumerate in detail its history during a period extending over ten years. The Vokes family made their London de-The Vokes family made their London de-but at the Lyceum theater. December 26, 1868, in the pantomime of "Humpty Dumpty." The Vokes crossed the At-lantic ten thres and their travels took them half over the world. It is worthy of note that the pieces in which they appeared were for the most part written and invented by themselves and many of the incidents pre-sented were simply illustrations of droll events and adventures that they had net with during and adventures that they had met with during their travels. "Fun in a Fog." for instance, was based on the incidents of their journey across the plains with the fil-fated Custer.

On marrying Rosina Vokes retired from the stage, but returned to it after a short absence. She organized a company of her own and ap-She organized a company of her own and ap-peared as a star, playing many success-ful engagements in Great Britain and America. Her last appearance was in Chicago, in November, 1803, when she played at Hooley's in "Maid Marian," "Dream Faces," "The Circus Rider" and other comedies. She was ill at the time and it was announced that she was about to retire from the stage permanently on account of her failing health.

PAINTER HANGED. FROM WASHINGTON.

Work of Our Lawmakers in the Fifty-Third Congress.

Important Measures Under Discussion in the Senate and House-A Brief Review of the Dally Proceedings.

THE SENATE. WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.-The Hawaiian question came before the senate again vesterday and after an hour's discusson went over for the day. The bill repealing the federal election laws was further discussed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 .- In the senate yesterday the federal election law was discussed and protests were presented against the placing of coal and lumber on the free list in the tariff bill.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.-The session of the senate yesterday was devoted to a discussion of Senator Call's public land resolution and a general colloquy over the federal election bill. Senator Dolph (rep., Ore.) offered an amend-ment to the Hawaiian resolution declaring that Minister Willis should be recalled. Adjourned to the 29th.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. -- Senator Teller (Col.) addressed the senate yester-day on the president's Hawaiian policy, taking advanced ground in favor of the annexation of the Hawaiian islands and ultimately of Cuba and Canada. The house bill to repeal the federal election laws was also discussed and a resolution was offered declaring that the secretary of the treasury has no legal right to issue and sell the bonds and other interest-bearing obligations of the government. The House.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 .- The amend ments to the iron schedules shared the same fate in the house yesterday as those to the coal schedule Tuesday. They were overwhelmingly defeated and iron ore remains upon the free list. The remainder of the afternoon was spent in the discussion of amendments looking to the free admission of ma-

terday. An amendment to repeal the reciprocity section in the McKinley bill was adopted. At a democratic caucus it was decided to attach the income tax bill to the tariff bill.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.-In the hou 2 yesterday the only amendment to the tariff bill adopted was one increasing the duty on diamonds, unset, to 30 per cent. ad valorem. Convicted of the Murder of Alice Martin, He Pays the Penalty. CHICAGO, Jan. 27.-George H. Painter was hanged in the corridor of the

county jail at 8:03 a. m. yesterday for the murder of Alice Martin. On the scaffold he made a brief speech, concluding as follows: "If I killed Alice Martin-the woman I dear-

eluding as follows: "IT fkilled Alice Martim-the woman I dear-ly loved, the woman I loved so much that I would have almost committed a crime for her, I pray this minute-my last minute on earth -that the Eternal God will put me-into eternal hell. Look here, gentlemen, if there is one man among you who is an Amer-ican, I say to you on his soul, I say, see that the murderer of Alice Martin is found. Good-by." Tainter's alleged crime for which he suffered the penalty of death was the murder of Alice Martin, in her room at 86 Green street, about midnight May 17, 1891. A man-named Truesdale and a woman named Morris also lived in the house. A few moments before IE o'clock they heard quarreling in the room of Alice Martin, fol-lowed by sounds as if blows were being struck and a fight was in progress. A few moments later they were startled by the appearance of Painter, who rushed into their room crying out: "Alice has been murdered." His coat, they declared, was some what bloody and he was greatly excited. Taey followed him back to the room where they found the lifeless body of Alice Martin lying across the bed and evi-dences of a terrible struggle. Painter gave the alarm to the police. NATIONAL BOARD OF TRADE.

It Adjourns After Adopting Resolutions on Many Topics. WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 .- At the morn ing session of the National board of trade a resolution was passed memo-rializing congress that Senator Mor-gan's bill for a guarantee of \$70,000,000 of Nicaragua canal bonds should be enacted. Other resolutions adopted were as follows:


were as follows: Urging prompt action by congress on all matters relating to the tariff and revenue, in order that the industries of the country may adjust themselves to any new conditions, and to recuperate from the effects of the recent financial crisis. Favoring the cre-ation of a commission to investigate and proset to conserve upon the subject of report to congress upon the subject of the development of a comprehensive system of free waterways connecting some of the great cities of the country and principal lakes and rivers; fayoring the deepening and widening of the channels of the Delaware and Chris-tina rivers: favoring the consolidation of third and fourth-class mail matter at a rate of 1 cent for two ounces; favoring the suggestion made by Postmaster General Bissell in his last annual report that congress make direct appropriations for incidental expenses to ten of the larger post offices of the country; me-morializing congress to amend the national banking law so as to provide that all infractions of the provisions be re-ferred to a commission consisting of the secrethat be retary of the treasury, the comptroller of the currency and the treasurer of the United

States After a number of resolutions of thanks had been adopted the board adjourned sine die.
