NINE BRAVE MEN.

They Die While Fighting Fire in a Milwaukee Theater.

The Roof Falls, Carrying the Firemen Into a Fiery Furnace-List of the Dead and Injured-The Property Loss Heavy.

DIED WHILE ON DUTY.

MILWAUKEE, April 10.-Nine firemen met a horrible death in a fire which destroyed the Davidson theater on Third street between 4 and 5 a. m. Monday. The big stone building, which contained the finest playhouse in the city and the Davidson hotel, was burned to the ground in the midst of a blinding storm of rain and sleet, and in the final crash of falling roof and walls several companies of the frightful that has befallen the city since the Newhall house burned down, when scores of lives were lost. A Total Loss.

The valuable scenery and property of the Lilliputians, whose ten days' engagement at the theater was to close on Wednesday, is all gone. Manager Rosenthal of the company says it was worth \$50,000.

Plunged to a Flery Death.

Shortly after 5 o'clock, when the fire was seemingly under control, the theater roof, on which a score or mere firemen stood as they fought the flames, went down, and the brave men were carried with it to the floor of the auditorium below. Some were extricated from the furnace of flames. in which the whole interior was now enveloped, by their brave and more fortunate comrades, who risked their lives to drag out the prostrace forms of the dead and injured men. Six or eight men were soon brought out, and those who were able to speak said there were ten or more in the ruins, where living death awaited them. For these poor fellows there was no chance. The burning roof had fallen on them, and they were roasted to death, if they had not been killed outright in that terrible plunge from the roof.

A cry of horror went up from the firemen who saw the awful catastrophe. The members of the insurance patrol were covering up the seats in the parquet of the theater when suddenly a light was seen through the roof above. The men in the theater ran back just in time, and the next moment the roof fell into the parquet of the theater. Several of the men in the theater were caught by the falling timbers.

BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

Mercantile Agencies Differ as to the Trade Situation.

Dun & Co. Say They Discern Indications of Good Times - Bradstreet Can Find Nothing in the Situation to Boast Of.

DUN'S REVIEW OF TRADE, NEW YORK, April 7 .-- R. G. Dun &

Co.'s review says:

"Improvement in business has continued "Inprovement in business has continued since the president's veto, which has been sustained in the house, but the best news of the week is the great decrease in the number and importance of the failures. The number was 2,000 in January, 1,302 in February and 1,005 in March. The commercial liabilities were \$31,320,867 in January, \$17,920,419 in February and \$14,728,893 in March. Nearly half the commercial liabilities were of firms failing during the first month; March. Nearly haif the commercial liabilities were of firms failing during the first month; much more than haif of the trading liabilities, 54 per cent as the full statement shows 42 per cent of the manufacturing liabilities, and 49 per cent, of the other commercial liabilities. Moreover, nearly two-thirds of the banking liabilities were of failures in the first mouth and over half of the railroad liabilities. Though the number of commercial failures, 4.297 in the United States, was never equaled in any quarter until the third of last year, the average of liabilities is third of last year, the average of liabilities is only \$14,890, which is lower than has appeared in the records of thirty-eight years at any time elosely succeeding any serious reverse. The degree of commercial soundness and health thereby indicated gives ground for hope that the liquidations consequent upon the disaster of 1893 have been in large measure accom-

"Wheat has been lifted about 4 cents by reports of serious injury to the plant, but the accounts are more than usually conflicting and there is much uncertainty about the extent of the injury. Corn has declined 1½ cents, while pork has risen 50 cents, with lard a shade better. The failures for the last week have been 249 in the United States, against 195 last year, and 26 in Canada, against 28 last year. Bradstreet Not So Hopeful.

Bradstreet's says:

"Special telegrams from important distributing centers report general trade quite irregu-lar, previous gains having been followed by shrinkages in many instances. There is a slight gain in business at Pittsburgh in staple

slight gain in business at Pittsburgh in staple merchandise, as well as among manufacturers of bessemer, pig and billets.

"The delay of expected revival in trade at Cincinnati, Detroit and Louisville has had a depressing influence, and is aided by unseasonable, weather; but business is reported at Indianapolis, and the expectation is for a good suring trade. Chicago, jobbars, in con-Indianapolis, and the expectation is for a good spring trade. Chicago jobbers in cotton dress fabrics, silks, hardware, clothing and lumber report increased sales, but at St. Louis un'avorable weather has checked the demand for dry goods and millinery and kindred lines, although expectation is for an improvement in the demand because country stocks are not large. Kansas City reports considerable activity in general lines, as does Omaha, where improved weather and good roads have stimulated business. Planting throughout Nebraska is being pushed, but the crops need rain. At both cities last mentioned live stock interests have improved.

Strikers Force Coke Workers to Leave Their Jobs.

Uniontown, Pa., April 10.—All was comparatively quiet in the coke region Monday, although there have been a few outbreaks. The renewal of hostilities has not begun in earnest yet, but the situation is becoming more critical every hour. Raius were made at the Youngstown of the Frick company and at the Lemonts of the McClure company. Four hundred dred strikers assembled and prevented the plants from starting. They met at the Lemonts and made the first raid. All the men were at work but left the yards on the approach of the strikers and refused to go back to work for fear of serious trouble. Then the men marched to Youngstown, armed with clubs and stones. They found a few at work in the yards and a number in the pit and at once drove them off, warning them not to return. No property was de-stroyed and no one was injured.
