Trade Circles. In Spite of Scarcity of Fuel and the Big

Rallway Strike Business Prospects Are Apparently More Favorable.

### DUN & CO.'S REPORT.

NEW YORK, June 30 .- R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says:

The depletion of the treasury reserve has been checked by the voluntary deposit of gold in New York banks. Exports of goods have almost ceased. Congress has made much progress toward final disposition of the tariff question. Crop prospects grow better as the betweet depage another. harvest draws nearer

The resumption of work in mines and mills "The resumption of work in mines and mine has made good progress, but the demand for products is as yet smaller and less urgent than was expected. Textile manufacturers are much embarrussed by the near approach of probable change in the tariff, the effect of which cannot yet be calculated. In spite of this reason for deferring orders and purchases, the number of mills quitting work is not as large as was expetted, for there appears a little more domand from clothlers and jobbers. "Wheat has declined two cents. Cosn has de-

clined seven-eighths of a cent, receipts being larger than of wheat, and a heavy crop is ex-pected. Pork products are also a shade lower. Cotton has yielded a sixteenth, as speculation against the enormous stocks in sight grows tiresome.


"This week the failures have been 214 in the United States. against 307 last year, and 35 in Canada, against 37 last year. Of late the number and importance of failures have in-creased a little, as is usual near the close of a half year."

Bradstreet's Review.

NEW YORK, June 30.-Bradstreet's says:

"While there is no actual improvement in business throughout the country there are more favorable prospects and better feeling among merchants, with an increased number of inmerchants, with an increased number of in-stances where trade has been stimulated. The ending of the great bitumin-ous coal strike is promptly followed by a sympathetic strike of railroad em-ployes, which threatens disastrous effect on business by reason of interference with distribusiness by reason of interference with distri-bution and travel. Losses on perishable freight in transit are already reported. Other un-favorable features include a conference of Rhodo Island cotton mill owners as to the advisability of shutting down, owing to accumulation of stocks, heavy arrivals of wool at eastern markets, where stocks are already large: delay in settling the coke strike, which prevents many industrial estabstrike, which prevents many industrial estab-lishments from starting up; an extremely re-stricted volume of business among whole-sale dealers in clothing at Baltimore. 43 per cent of what it was in the first half of last year; delayed orders from country merchants in Georgia and South Carolins, where crop damage has been threatened; and a sharp restriction in the vol-ume of general trade at Chicago, where the railway strike centors. the following query: "Supposing 100 represents your collecAsh Wednesday,


Ash Wednesday is so called from the curious custom of strewing ashes on the head as a sign of penitence. It was prob-ably instituted by Gregory the Great, who was pope from 590 to 604. Origi-nally the ashes were consecrated on the altar before mass, sprinkled with holy water and signed three times with the cross. During this ceremony the priest recited these words, "Memento quod cinis es et in cincrem reverteris." (Rememper that thou art dust and must return to dust.) The ashes thus consecrated were then strewn on the heads of the officiating priests and the assembled people. The ashes were usually obtained by burning the palms consecrated on the preceding (Palm) Sunday.—St. Louis Republic.

The Jewish law ordered that the grainfields should not be gleaned, and that the wheat in the corners of the fences or walls should not be gathered, in order that something might be left for the poor. No farmer might forbid poor persons from entering his fields and gleaning after the reapers.
