ALLISON ON SILVER.

The Iowa Senator Talks of Questions of Finance.

His Idea of the Cause of Depreciation of Silver-He Declares the Metal Has Not Reen Demonstized-Need of Sound Currency.

MARSALLTOWN, Is., April 22 .- Senator Allison was banqueted by the Duluth, said, with much bitterness: Traveling Men's Republican club of this city Friday night, and spoke at length upon the silver question, with ator, who said, among other things:

ator, who said, among other things: "I have no doubt that finance is a familiar tople to you, and it certainly is to me. I have seen more bills, received more pamphlets, and read more upon this subject during the last year than ever before. You can all see that-to use a familiar expression-there is a sorew loose somewhere, for we have seen our coun-try pass in two or two and a half years from a condition of prosperity to one of panle and dis-tress. We are told we have come to this sti-uation solely because of the condition of one of the precious motals, and I realize that there is no more important question than that of the meney we use." money we use

Natural Money Metals.

He added that gold and silver were precious metals because of their divisibility and their nondestructibility. He referred to the fact that gold and silver were for thousands of years the money of the world, and rapidly sketched the history of the mining of these precious metals and the effect of their output infunction of paid

procious metals and the effect of their output as influenced by wars upon the stock of gold and silver in the world. He continued: "It is said that in 1829 there was less than \$1,000,000,000 of gold in the world. From 1850 to 1875 there was produced in the world of gold within about \$200,000,000 of the amount produced from 1493 to 1850. During the 500 years prior to 1850 there was produced about \$7,000,000,000 of silver, but dur-ing the twenty-five years ending 1875 there was produced nearly three times as much gold as silver.

Cessation of Free Coinage.

The speaker referred at great length to " Cessation of Free Coinage. The speaker referred at great length te money legislation in European countries. Re-ferring to the cessation of free coinage of ali-ments of the various mints of Europe, he said it was the diffusion of both metals through more that kept them at a parity. "It is said in 1874 we demonstized silver. It is true that at that time we changed the laws of our mints and established gold as a standard of value. I belleve now that it was a mistake for Europe and for us to have changed these standards. But for twelve years prior to 1878 we were on a paper basis and it was not looked upon by our people as an important feature. No action of ours in 1878 affected the price of all von-modules and appreciate gold in the same measure that silver was depreciated. I don't believe it. Since 1878 some prices have been reduced and some advanced. Gold and silver until put in shape of money were com-modities and are governed by the laws of supply and demand; and just that thing hap-pend to silver and gold as happened under these laws to other commodities. In every pened to sliver and gold as happened under these laws to other commodities. In every country of Europe in 1873 the mint was open to sliver, and in 1877 tot a single mint in Europe was open to sliver except for fractiona coins. We were then upon a paper basis and could exert no influence upon supply and demand. From that time the supply of sliver increased, and with an increased supply and no demand in Europe it was the most nat-ural thing in the world that sliver should depreciate.

> Upward Movement in Wheat, Cotton, Beef, Oll, Etc.-Wages of Textile Mill-Workers Are Advanced-The Failure Record.

NEW YORK, April 20.-R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade says:

"In every speculative department business "In every speculative department business is growing, but this is really the least satis-factory feature of the situation. Cotton oll and wheat climb above the export price. so that the marketing of products abroad must be checked and money is absorbed which ought to be employed in productive industry and in distribution of products to consumers.

The Boom in Oll. "Everybody knows that oll has not risen 200 per cent because it is intrinsically more valu-able, nor is wheat actually worth more than it able, nor is wheat actually worth more than to was two or three weeks ago, but the expensive and uplifting force has unfortunately taken to speculation rather than to production, and so we have higher prices in all speculative markets without a larger de-mand for consumption. Advance in Cotton.

"There is no evidence that cotton is in larger demand than it was when the price was a cent lower, but prices have been so low for months that an upward movement was easy without much reason, though stocks here and abroad are 300,000 bales larger than they were abroad are sound bates targer than they were at the same date after the greatest crop ever produced heretofore, and spinners here and abroad have taken about 1,000,000 bales more than they have consumed. Upward Movement in Wheat.

"Wheat has advanced over three cents dur-ing the past week. There is no indication that the foiling demand will increase, while the prospects for this year's crop are considered excellent. Western receipts are not large, and it would be strange if they were, with prices so low, but advancing. Exports continue to indicate that the European demand will not be particularly heavy this season. Rise in Beef Prices.


HOLIDAY MAIL SERVICE. The Postmaster General Formulates New Rules Concerning It.

WASHINGTON, April 22 .- The post master general has amended the postal laws and regulations regarding holidays. The amendment states that postmasters may observe as holi-days January 1, February 22, May 30, July 4, the first Monday in September known as Labor day, December 25, and such other days as the president of the United States or the governors in their respective states may designate fast or thanksgiving days proclaim specifically as holidays. 85 or On other occasions their offices can be closed only after permission obtained therefor from the department, to be applied for through the first assistant postmaster general. Upon holidays post offices must be opened sufficiently to meet fairly the public convenience. Mails must be made up and dispatched as on other days. When a legal holiday falls upon a Sunday the following Monday may be observed, unless other-wise specially provided for by state authority.

Mr. Kohlsaat said in regard to the policy and politics of the papers in the future: "In local politics the Times-Herald and Evening Post will be independent. On the monetary question they will be unalterably opposed to the free coinage of silver and in favor of honest money. While generally independent in national politics the papers will be advocates of protection to American industries."

The avowed intention of the new publisher of the Times-Herald to make a protectionist paper out of it deprives Chicago of a democratic morning paper printed in English. The passing of the Evening Post under the same control also reduces the democratic afternoon papers printed in English to one.

Big Incendiary Fire in Pennsylvania. PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 23.- The entire central business section of Duquesne, on the Monongahela river 12 miles from Pittsburgh, was destroyed by fire Monday morning. The loss is about \$100,000, Twenty buildings were destroyed, composing what was known as the First national block, on Railroad street. The fire-originated in the First national bank building about 4 o'clock, and is supposed to have been caused by incendiaries.
