THE NEXT CONGRESS.

Silver Advocates and Bimetallists Strong in the House.

Result of a Poll Upon the Silver, Tariff and Income Tax Questions-Answers Made by Many Old and New Congressmen.

NEW YORK, June 8.-The World prints the result of a telegraphic poll of the next congress upon the silver, tariff and income tax questions. The congress will not meet until December, but it is a matter of great importance to the people to know as nearly as possible what may be expected of this body and especially of the new and untried members of it. The following questions were asked of each: "Do you favor single gold standard or free

coinage?" "Do you favor further tariff changes?" "Do you favor the principle of the incom tax?

The Money Question.

Answers were received from about one-half of the members of the next congress. In a general way it may be said that out of 116 members who gave unequivocal answers to the silver quesfree coinage, 44 favor bimetallism generally, with the proviso of an international agreement. Only 17 can fairly be classed as favoring a single gold standard, and some of these, even, are not definite. The southern and far western states are almost unanimous for free coinage, the central states lean toward silver with bimetallic qualifications, and it is only in New York, New England and adjacent eastern states that there are any avowedly gold standard men. Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colo-

rado, Florida, Idaho, Missouri, Mon-tana, Nevada, North Carolina, South Carolina, South Dakota, Virginia, Washington and Wyoming are solid for silver, so far as heard from.

The bimetallists are chiefly in Delaware, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, Penn-sylvania and West Virginia.

New York, New Jersey, Pennsyl-vania, Rhode Island, Massachusetts and Vermont have the gold advocates. The Tariff.

The possibility of renewed tariff agitation is apparent in the replies to the question as to the further changes in the tariff. Only twenty-eight members are against all change, while thirty-five favor moderate changes and thirty-eight are pronounced for radical changes. Most of the latter are republicans who desire to see the Mo-Kinley law restored. A few are free traders. The moderates are chiefly those who think changes will be neces sary in order to increase revenues. The Income Tax.

The income tax question brought out many sharp and piquant answers and proved that even in the minds of congressmen a supreme court decision does not always decide. Forty-nine congressmen say that they favor the principle of the tax. Forty-seven oppose it. A great many evaded the question or failed to answer it.

A NEW SECRETARY. Attorney General Olney Said to Be Mr. Gresham's Successor.

BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

The Situation Seems to Be Full or Encouragement.

Though Slightly Checked Through Fear of Crop Damage-Wages Continue to Advance.

NEW YORK, June 1.-Bradstreet's

NEW YORK, June 1.—Bradstreet's says: "The observance of Memorial day services served to check the volume of general trade this week, but there has been a further shrink-age in the amount of business transacted, due to not altogether well founded fears of serious damage to the grain crops. Reports to Bradstreet's from manufacturing indus-trics at seventy-five cities east of the Rocky mountains show that more than 227 important manufacturing con-cerns started up between April 1 and a week ago by reason of which 53,000 employes have secured work. But the additional and sig-nificant fact is found in the report that wages of no fewer than 178,000 industrial employes have been advanced within this period an av-erage of 10 per cent. of whom six-sevenths reerge of 10 per cent, of whom six-sevenths re-ceived the advance without striking. "The tendency of prices this week is again ngward, notably so for steel and iron. At the larger eastern cities the volume of business is slowly but steadily explanding. ascertained.

"While there has been no noteworthy change in the state of trade in part of the central western states, the region about Chicago and west thereof, including the St Louis, Kanwest thereof, including the St Louis, Kan-sus City, Omaha and Des Moines fields, reports a moderate check to the volume of business this week, due to fears of crop damage. Prolonged dry weather has made its influence felt on demand for all staples at Kansas City and on mercautile col-lections also. This is true of Ne-braska and Iowa points also, except that in the former state a good rain in the middle of the week revived confidence some-what. Seventeen-year locusts have appeared throughout Neoraska, but thus far in that as if other leading grain-producing states the damage done crops is said to be less than re-ported from day to day in the press.



FORESTS ABLAZE. Flames Destroy Valuable Property in the Oil Region. BRADFORD, Pa., June 4.-Forest fires are again raging in this vicinity and much property is being destroyed. Five rigs, tanks and boilerhouses, belonging to the Middleland Oil company, were destroyed near Hunters' Run, 17 miles from Kane, Sunday. A large quantity of logs and lumber were burned.

Fires are raging at Chipmunk, Tally-ho, Guffey and along the line of the Erie & Buffalo, Bochester & Pitts-burgh railways between this city and Johnsonburg. The settlement of Coon Run, in Elk county, 10 miles from Kane is reported completely wiped out. There were twenty-five dwelling houses in the village. 



CITY OF MEXICO, June 1 .- The number of people who perished by the sink-ing of the steamer Colima was 187. The ship carried 213 persons. Twenty-six of this number escaped. They are nearly all Americans and will be sent north at once. The vessel is a complete loss.

National Bank Notes.

WASHINGTON, June 3 .- The monthly statement of the comptroller of the currency showed the amount of national bank notes outstanding on the 1st to be \$211,388,029, an increase for May of \$1,759,106, and for the last twelve months of \$4,287,847.

"Failures for three weeks of May have shown liabilities amounting to \$7,455,244, of which \$2,642,609 were of manufacturing and 14,130,635 of trading concerns. For the same weeks last year the liabilities amounted to \$7,782,633, of which \$3,380,812 were of manufacturing and \$3,275,275 of trading concerns. The failures during the past week have been 215 in the United States against 183 last year, and 34 in Canada against 27 last year."
