### SILVER PLATFORM.

Adopted by the Convention Held in Memphis, Tenp.

Joint Use of Both Wilver and Gold Beeommended-Result of Monetary Conferences-Free Colnage Is Demanded.

MEMPAIS, Tenn., June 14.—With the adoption of the following platform and several speeches the silver convention came to an end yesterday:

"Silver and gold com have in all ages constituted the money of the world, were the money of the fathers of the republic, the money of history and of the constitution. "The universal experience of mankind has demonstrated that the joint use of both affiver and gold coin as money constitutes the most stable standard of value and that the full amount of both metals is necessary as a me-

dium of exchange.
"The demonetization of either of these historic metals means an appreciation from the value of money, a fall in the prices of commod-ities, a diminution of the profits of legitimate business, a continuing increase in the burden of debts, a withdrawal of money from the channels of trade and industry where it no longer yields a safe and sure return and its idle accumulation in the banks and the great

money centers of the country.
"There is no health or soundness in a financial system under which a hoarded dollar is cial system under which a hoarded dollar is productive of increase to its possessor while an invested dollar yields a constantly diminishing return, and under which fortunes are made by the accretions of idle capital or destroyed by a peraistent fall in the price of commodities and a peraistent dwindling in the margin of profits in almost every branch of useful industry. Such a system is a premium upon aloth and a penalty upon industry, and such a system is that which the criminal legislation of 1878 has imposed upon this country.

Tested and Approved.

"The bimetallic standard of silver and gold."

"The bimetallic standard of silver and gold has behind it the experience of ages and has been tested and approved by the enlightened and deliberate judgment of mankind. The gold standard is a departure from the estabgold standard is a departure from the estab-lished policy of the civilized world, with noth-

dition of rising prices, large profits, general contentment and great prosperity, to a condi-tion of falling prices, diminishing profits, in-security of investments, unemployed lasecurity of investments, unemployed la-bor and a heavy depression in all branches of trade and industry. It is not 2 matter of dispute, even among the honest advocates of the gold standard, that general prosperity came to an end with the destruction of the bimetallic symtem and that hard times, falling prices, idle working-men and widespread depression came in with the gold standard and prevails to-day wher-ever the gold standard has been adopted.

A Blunder, If Not a Crime. "Every international monetary conference that has been called, every demand in this country and Europe for an international agreement to reestablish the bimetallic standard, is a confession that the demonetization of the system was a blunder, if not a crime, that its consequences have been disastrons and that the quences have been disastrous and that the ns that it has wrought are full of men-

"The logic of facts establishes beyond intel-ligent question that the destruction of silver as primary money by a conspiracy of mellish interests is the cause of the widespread depression and suffering that began with the gold stand-ard. There can be no restoration of pros-

How to Secure a Stable Standard "We believe in a stable value; we believe least of all in an appreciating standard; it is only through the practical operation of bimetallism that a stable standard of value can be secured. A standard constituted of money constantly increasing in value is not a sound, a single nor a stable standard but a constantly changing standard. This reserved right is a part of every bond, of every contract end of every obligation. No creditor or claimant can every obligation. No creator of the masses of its own people. This is a debt higher and more binding than all other debts, and one which is not only dishonest but treason-

Secretary Carlisle Makes His Third Speech in Kentucky.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 15.—Secretary John G. Carlisle delivered his third sound money speech in Kentucky Friday night to an immense audience in Music hall, this city. Mr. Carlisle was introduced by Hon. Charles R. Long, of the democratic state executive committee. The secretary's address was mostly a repetition of his speeches at Covington and Bowling Green only that he directed his efforts mainly to the working classes, which composed the major portion of his audience. He made no reference to the attacks of Senator Blackburn and others, and some of his most enthusiastic hearers were , democratic candidates for office. Following is a synopsis of his remarks: Mr. Carlisle spoke mainly of how the United States could not alone maintain free coinage and made a most lucid explanation of the evils which he said would follow the free and unlimited coinage of silver. ### INTERSTATE COMMERCE.

A Synopsis of the Commission's Report for 1894.

WASHINGTON, June 17 .- The seventh statistical report of the interstate commerce commission has just been submitted. It covers the fiscal year 1894 and completes the pre-liminary statistics published last December. The first part of the report covers the last four months of the Columbian exposition, during which time there was an increased passenger traffic. The second part covers a period of widespread business depression. The third, commencing June 30, 1894, when 192 roads operating upwards of 42,000 miles line and representing about one-fourth of the total railway capitalization were in the hands of receivers. The effect of these conditions is apparent in nearly all of the figures presented. The report shows:

The total railway mileage in the United States was 178,708, an increase during the year of 2,247 miles. The increase during the previous year was 4,897.

During the year 1,579 locomotives and 30,386 cars were fitted with train brakes, and 1,197

lecomotives and 34,185 cars were fitted with automatic couplers. While the gain in the use of both of these safety appliances is in excess of the increase of equipment, 74 per cent of the total equipment are still without train brakes and 72 per cent without automatic couplers.

The total number of railway employes on June 30, 1894, was 779.008, a decrease of 98,994, and less than in any year since 1890. The total amount of reported railway capital on June 30, 1894, was \$10,796.478,813, an increase

A Denver Capitalist Charged with a Large


