AN AWFUL DEED.

Diplomat Foster Talks of the Chinese-A Chicagoan Kills His Entire Family and Himself.

Evidently Crazed, He Opens a Gas Jet and with His Wife and Four Children Inhales the Deadly Stuff-All Are Found Dead.

CHICAGO, July 6 .- Frederick Hellman,

a contractor, on Thursday night murdered his wife and four children by asphysiation and died with them. The ictims of his horrible crime were: Fritz Helman, 36 years old. Hellman cottage, 601 Cornelia street. The house is small, but it was their own, and the Hellman family was supposed to be living happily together. That the murder was deliberately

planned by the father of the family during the past few weeks seems beyond doubt. Ever since Hellman built his house it has been supplied with gas pipes but there has been come out of it with better grace than any other. From the first her interest has been recognized by both beligerents as purely disinterested, her only desire being to render such service as would bring about an honorable and lasting peace. The conduct of the stare denartment in fivery no connection with the gas main, and there were no fixtures in the house. Several weeks ago Hellman had his pipes connected and fixtures put in the family bedroom only, the entire family delicate relations with both combatants has been marked by good judgment and by few mistakes, and the good offices of our ministers sleeping in one small room.
