Bosron, Aug. 27.—Boston is the Mecca of tens of thousands of the most prominent and representative citizens of the United States. From every part of the continent, from far-away Texas and Louisiana, from California and Oregon and from all the commonwealths between the representatives of the Knights Templar of the United States are gathering for their twenty-sixth triennial conclave. It is forty-five years since the hub was similarly honored, the last meeting of the grand commandery here having taken place in 1850. In the interval Chicago, New York, New Orleans, San Francisco, Den-Lexington, Ky., and Cleve-

A great feature of the gathering this year is the great number of visitors who are attracted simply as spec-tators. All trains from New Eng-land points are late from one to two hours, and a glance at the hotel registers shows that there is hardly a town, viliage or hamlet in all the six New England states that is not represented. The railroad men have been taken completely by surprise, but they are making hurried plans to meet the emergency, and say they expect to bring in over 250,000 people before the parade starts Tuesday, besides those from the suburban towns that make up greater
