Proceedings of the Encampment at Louisville.

Address by Henry Watterson-Reports of the Officials-St. Paul Gets the Next Gathering-Closing Scenes

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 13.-Glad of the opportunity to rest awhile from the pleasures and festivities that have been showered upon them during the week, the official delegates to the twenty-ninth encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic assembled yesterday morning in Music hall and listened to a speech from Henry Watterson that overflowed with pa-triotism. He said in part; Part of the Address.

Annual Address. The hall was then cleared of all not members of the G. A. R., and after prayer the business session of the enapment began Commander in Chief Lawler, in his annual address, touched of Ohio. Ex-Congressman John A. on many subjects of interest to the veterans. We know that all the legislation enacted by congress in the interest of the old soldier has been brought about by or through the infinence of this great, powerful organization—the Grand Army of the Republic—and those of us who are more fortunate physically than others propose to keep it up just as long as we live. And while we are not saking others propose to keep it up just as long as we live And while we are not asking for any new pension legislation, we do ask and insist that when a law is passed by congress its provisions, as intended by them, shall be carried out and not misconstrued and misapplied by any man or set of men of any party who may be in power. I am not a lawyer, but I know the verdict of any court of loyal men would be that after a man has furnished the proofs and has been granted a pension that pension cannot be taken away from him without due process of law. I know this is being done, however, all over the land, for I have seen evidences of it in every department in which I have been—pensions reduced from sit to 18, and from \$0.05, and hany cut off cuttrely. Then, again, a man who applied for a pension two and three parts ago will receive a notice that his case is reopened and allowed, but only from the time of reopening, thus cheating a worthy dian out of \$300 or so. Adjutant General's Report. The report of Adjt. Gen. C. C. Jones showed that the total membership in good standing on July 1 was 357,639. The number of members suspended at the same date was 49,600, figures which he regards as astounding. Nearly 8,000 veterans died during the year. There are 7,245 posts in the country.

The selection of St. Paul was made unanimous.

Indiana Honored. The election of officers was the next order. For commander in chief Gen. I. N. Walker, of Indianapolis, was nominated by his only competitor, Gen. Thayer, of Nebraska, and chosen unanimously. For senior vice commander in chief Gen. G. H. Hobson, of Greensburg, Ky., and for junior vice commander in chief S. G. Cosgrove, of the state of Washington, were chosen

by acclamation. Woman's Relief Corps. The annual convention of the ladies of the G. A. R. was called to order at the board of trade at 10:30 by the national president, Nettie Gunlock, of Chicago. The morning session was occupied with routine business.

The total membership at the present time, according to the reports, is 110,774 or again of 35,096 members over last year. curriculum. Pension Committee Reports.

The committee on pensions made a voluminous report in which the order voices its solemn protest against any policy which will impair or diminish liberal provisions made durthe past thirty years for the assistance of veterans of the late war. The report denonnces the burdens and restrictions imposed upon pensioners by recent constructions placed upon the laws as unjust and unwise in the extreme. It insists that the law which constitutes a pension once granted a vested right of which the possessor cannot be deprived except by due process of law shall be carried out with the utmost good faith. The report was adopted.

The newly elected officers were installed and the encampment adjourned sine die.

A resolution was adopted praying to congress for the passage of a law imposing a penalty for the violation of the veterans' pension law. Other resolutions adopted were in the same line as indicated by the foregoing.

Other Officers Chosen. The Woman's Relief Corps elected Mrs. Elizabeth Turner, of Boston, as president; the Daughters of Veterans selected Mrs. Ellen M. Walker, of Worcester, Mass., as their president, and the National Association of ex-Prisoners of War elected as president George W. Grant, of Minnesota.

HISTORIC GROUND.

National Military Park at Chickamauga to Be Dedicated.

Many Governors and Their Staffs Will Attend-Preparations for the Great Event-A Description of the Park.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Sept. 16.— Nearly a third of a century ago the battlefield of Gettysburg was dedicated as a national cemetery. On that occasion President Lincoln delivered an address which recognized as the philosophy, in brief, of the great struggle then impending between the north and south. In this address, in words long since historic, he formulated the doctrine that "this nation under God shall have a new birth of freedom and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

On Thursday and Friday of this week the Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military park will be dedicated with ceremonies no less imposing than those at Gettysburg, made memorable by Mr. Lincoln's pres-ence. The time chosen has especial appropriateness, in that it will be the thirty-second anniversary of the fiercely contested battle of Chickamauga, in many respects one of the most decisive of the war, and one in which American pluck and endurance were shown to greatest advantage.

Some Distinguished Visitors. Accommodations have been prepared for 40,000 visitors, an average of one guest to every man, woman and child in the city. The governors of the fol-lowing states have notified the national commission they will be here, with their full staffs:

Description of the Park. The Chickamauga and Chattanooga park mauga and the approaches. The arena within mada and the approaches. Those about Chattanoga lie mainly along the lines of battle. Two of the number, the crest and state road, are constructed on a 50-foot right of way. The scenery along a part of this military boulevard is such as will give the drive a national reputation. TONE OF TRADE.

The Business Situation as Viewed by the Agencies. New York, Sept. 14.-R. G. Dun &

Co.'s weekly review of trade says: "A slight set-back which may mean much or nothing, according to the final outcome of the crops, is not unexpected at this season. If the government crop reports were correct, the situation would not be encouraging. But not much confidence is placed in the reduced es timate of corn, none at all in the estimate of wheat, and even the most enthusiastic bulls do not think it worth while to quote the government report as to cotton. The fact is that we are beginning to market not far from 2,200,000,000 bushels of corn, though only about 500,000. of corn, though only about 500,000,-000 bushels will be moved from the countles where it is grown: about 450,000,000 bushels of wheat, of which the farmers are unwisely

holding back a large proportion; and about 7,500,000 bales of cotton, if the later indications are not erronsous, as they very easily may be, to add to the stocks carried over.

"The wheat crop is evidently larger than the department has estimated, though nobody knows how much larger, and is comming forknows how much larger, and is coming for knows how much larger, and is coming for-ward with more encouraging rapidity, no less than 5.773.175 bushels having been received at western ports, against 5.446.001 busn-els for the same week last year, from a much larger crop. The price declined sharply, about 2 cents per bush-el, with little indication of recovery. The price of corn has also yielded with a strong prespect of the largest crop ever grown, and at \$8 cents at New York a large proportion of the crop will be of little profit to farmers

the crop will be of little profit to farmers.

The failures during four weeks of August amounted to 88.125.00, of which \$3.853,300 were of manufacturing and \$4,103.804 of trading concorns; but for the first week of September the aggregate was \$1,495,677, of which \$685,643 were of manufacturing and \$755,534 of trading concerns. Failures for the week were 187 in the United States, against 219 last year, and 84 in Canada, against 44 last year."

"The week is characterized in trade circles "The week is characterized in trade circles by an unexpected, but no less pronounced, improvement south and southwest. This is reflected at markets from which supplies are distributed to these regions. Relatively unfavorable features are found in a quieter tone in dry goods jobbing circles: a check to seasonable trade throughout the central west, due to the unusual heat; low prices for men's wear woolens, an unsatisfactory outlook, due to pressed quotations abroad; only moder-ate orders for domestic woolen mann-factures; cancellation of a few Nebrasks gen-eral merchandise orders at Chicago, and the somewhat critical position of the American tin plate industry, owing to the heavy advance inspire of tin plate bars, without a corre-sponding increase in the price of tin plate."

A SHIPWRECK RECORD.

The Spanish Have Been Particularly Un

fortunate With Their Ships. The loss of the Reina Regente recalled the fact that Spain, once the greatest naval power of the world, has lost not less than 600 men-of-war in shipwreck since the beginning of the sixteenth century. There is ample documentary evidence to this effect, and the greatest disasters to the Spanish fleets are here recounted in their chronologic order.

Of the fleet sent against Algiers in 1518, under Admiral Don Hugo de Moncada, 30 vessels foundered in a storm. with 4,000 men on board.

Another expedition against Algiers, sent by Emperor Charles V in 1541, lost 140 vessels on the rocks of Marocco, 3,800 men losing their lives.

Of the fleet that sailed in 1562, under General Mendoza, to deliver Oran from the flagship, with the above named general on board, never returned.

A year later, in the fall of 1563, a yclone in the bay of Cadiz sent 15 of the government's best caravels to the bottom In 1588 the famous armada, believed

to be invincible, met her doom in the English channel, 81 out of 130 vessels sinking with most of their crews. The loss of men is estimated at 14,000. Fourteen of Admiral Don Antonio

Navarro's vessels foundered in a storm off the Mexican coast near San Juan de Ulloa in 1590. Six years later a fearful storm in the

Biscayan bay caused the loss of 41 vessels belonging to the fleet of Admiral Martin de Padilla.

Not long after this Admiral Marquis de Santa Cruz lost 10 vessels, with 2,800 men, on the Corsican coast.

After a long pause General Jose Piarro lost five men-of-war in an engage

ment with the English in 1741. Within the last 125 years the records are much easier of access, and the figures can be given absolutely correct. In this time the Spaniards lost 12 large battleships under steam and 21 first class sailers, with 1,570 guns; 23 frigates, with 800 guns, and more than 100 gunboats, torpedo boats, brigs, galeotes, etc. The loss of life in this period is conservatively estimated at 26,-500 men

Thus the worst enemy of Spanish supremacy on the seas seems to be other than man. More than double the number of ships have been lost by the inclemency of the elements than were lost

SELF DEFENSE.

The Law Relating Thereto Laid Down by

the Supreme Court. A United States district judge in Arkansas instructed a jury that everywhere except within his own house the law requires a man to run away and do his best to escape from an assailant before killing him. The judge further said that when assaulted on his own premises, but outside of his house, a man must show his sense of danger by efforts to escape before his plea that he killed his assailant to save himself from

great bodily harm can be accepted. This instruction was handed down from ancient times when weapons of assault consisted of knives, bludgeons, swords, etc., which an active man had some chance of escaping. But it is not applicable to these days of revolvers and winchesters, whose bullets no man can dodge or outrun, and the United States supreme court has sent it to the

black letter lumber garret. The man sentenced to eight years' imprisonment by the Arkansas judge obtained from the supreme court an order for a new trial under a new instruction. This new instruction declares that wherever a man may be, if he has a right to be there and if he has not himself provoked the assault, the law justifies him in standing his ground and killing his assailant provided the provable circumstances are such as to satisfy a jury that he had reasonable grounds for believing and acted on the belief that the killing was necessary to protect

himself from great bodily harm.
Putting any further limitation on the right to kill in self defense would abolish it altogether. Arkansas is only one of the many states in which a man may have to decide very hastily whether he shall be tried for killing a fellow citizen or let the fellow citizen be tried for killing him. In these cases, with his attention excitedly fixed on his assailant, he has no time to get legal advice or to study the necessities of the situation through the eyes of bystanders. Court and jury will do that afterward, and he is under restraint enough when he knows that in saving himself from the peril of the moment he incurs the further peril of having to satisfy a jury that his act as justified by the circumstances. - New York World.
