The Opening Session of the Fifty Fourth Assembly.

Reed Elected Speaker, and Other Canen minees Chosen for House Officers-The New Speaker's Address-Doings in the Senate.

Washington, Dec. 3.- Both houses of the 54th congress were called to order at noon Monday, the house by Clerk Kerr and the senate by Vice President Stevenson, who called upon the senators-elect to come forward as soon as their names were called by the clerk and take the oath of office

On motion of Mr. Cockrell (dem., Mo.) the hour of meeting of the senate was fixed at 12 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. Vilas (dem., Wis.) a committee of two was appointed to join a similar committee on the part of the house to wait upon the president, the vice president naming as such committee Mr. Vilas and Mr. Allison.

On motion of Mr. Harris (dem., Tenn.) the senate then at 12:30 took a recess for an hour, at which time it met and adjourned until to-day, the president's message not being forthcoming.

OUR NEW NAVY.

Extracts from the Annual Report of Sec retary Herbert

Washington, Dec. 2.—Advocates of con-tinuing the increase in the new navy will find satisfaction in the annual report of find satisfaction in the annual report of Secretary Herbert to the president. The secretary recommends the construction of two battleships and at least 12 torpedo boats, and he prefaces his recommendation with the statement that "an inspection of the tables herein given, showing the relative strength of navies will furnish, it is believed, all the argument now needed for the continuation of the building programme heretofore indicated by the action of congress. We are not in vant of ordinary unarmored cruisers or gunboats. action of congress. We are not in vant of ordinary unarmored cruisers or gunboats, but we are lamentably deficient in torpedo boats, and we certainly need more battleships. An inspection of the building programme of other nations will demonstrate that the lessons taught at Yaiu and Wel Hal Wel have tended to confirm the belief of naval experts throughout the world in the efficiency of these two classes of vessels."

Secretary Smith Tells of His De-

partment's Work.

Politics Should Be Eliminated from the Indian Bureau-The Public Lands-Protection of the Forests-

Washington, Nov. 29.-The report of Mr. the interior department. It begins with the Indian service and calls attention to the strict enforcement which has been given to civil service reform, both as to those places covered by the classified service and those to which the rules of this service do not apply. It dwells upon the necessity of eliminating politics from the management of Indian affairs, and of con-duction and property of the property of the promaingement of Indian affairs, and of con-ducing each reservation upon strictly business principles, the object being to make every Indian who remains upon the reservation self-supporting and ready, as soon as possible, to assume the duties of citizenship and be freed from the paternal care of the government. He recommends that instead of a single commissioner of Indian affairs the service be placed in

that instead of a single commissioner of Indian affairs the service be placed in charge of three commissioners—two of them to be civilians—to be appointed from different political parties and one to be a detailed army office.

The report shows that the attendance upon the Indian schools increased 1.500 during the past year, nearly one-half of the increase being in the government day schools. The reduction of 20 per cent which the law required to be made in connection with the contract schools has been strictly carried out, and the secretary adds that there seems to be no reason why such reduction should not continue from year to year until the system of government aid to sectarian schools shall terminate.

To Sell Reservations.

To Sell Reservation

The secretary also recommends that general authority, with the approval of the president, be given the Indian bureau to sell parts of Indian reservations, the money to be used exclusively in the improvement of allotted lands or for the purpose of furnishing agricultural implements and cattle to the Indians who may reside upon the remembring lands.

The Public Domain.

The report estimates the amount of public lands undisposed of to be about 600,900,000 acres at the close of the fiscal year, and shows that the total receipts during the year for public lands amounted to over \$200,000,000. The unadjusted land grants to railroads amount to nearly 90,000,000 acres. The secretary suggests the advisability of patenting the arid lands to the states after it is fully determined that the selections made by them under the Carey act are arid lands.




