## PERISHED BY FIRE.

Farmer Page, His Wife and Two Children Burned to Death.

Battle Creek, Jan. 31.—Harvey Page and his wife and two children, one s boy about five years old, and the other a girl of about three, were burned to death Thursday evening in their farmhouse about two miles from Marengo, just over the line in Lee township. They lived upstairs and the lower part of the house was occupied by his brother and wife.

Sometime in the night the brother was awakened by the cracking of flames over them, and found that the entire upper part of the house was burned and the roof fallen in. He and his wife had barely time to escape with their lives and did not save any of their clothes or furniture. When the flames were discovered Harvey Page and his wife and two children were all dead, and their bodies were soon reduced to ashes. The neighbors who assembled could do nothing to save the bodies, and the house burned with all of its contents.

# LOSS OF THE LUTINE.

MORE THAN \$1,000,000 WENT TO THE BOTTOM OF THE SEA.

Only Two Survivors Picked Up, and They Soon Died-Of the Vast Treasure \$500,-000 Has Been Recovered--Extensive Operations Under Way to Secure the Rest.

It was made from the rudder of the king's ship Lutine, which, in 1799, was wrecked in the North sea, with the largest amount of gold on board that ever went to the bottom. The Lutine was a 86 gun frigate, captured from the French in 1793.

#### VLAD VOSTOK.

An Interesting Pen Piëture of the Russian

Vladivostok has the aspect of an inferior Hongkong, of about a quarter the size. Hills crowned with forts rise round it up to a height of 800 feet. It lies on the sonth side of a peninsula 20 miles long, called Maravief Amursky, in 43 degrees 6 minutes 51 seconds north latitude, and 131 degrees 54 minutes 21 sec onds east longitude. The town is between four and five miles long, but is straggling and unconnected, and of no breadth. Some streets are very steep, and all are horribly dusty in dry weather, being never watered, and being continnally crossed in all directions by droskies driven at a smart pace. Instead of pavements the streets have "sidewalks" of planks, as commonly seen in new American cities. You take six stont planks, some 25 feet long, and lay them side by side, and you continue the process for the requisite number of versts or miles (three versts are two miles), and the "sidewalk" is complete, save for a few props and nails where the ground is too soft, or the foundation degenerated into holes.

The droskies are driven by redheaded, snub nosed Russian izvozchiks in low, glazed stovepipe hats, with very curly brims, red sleeves, plaited black skirts and high boots. In them one often sees, lolling as passengers, a couple of frowsy Chinese or a still frowsier Korean. The fare is only 80 kopecks, or 1 shilling and 18 pence, an hour, or over half an hour, and from point to point there are tenpenny and fivepenny fares, according to distance. The regulations forbid charging more, but, with fine irony, allow the driver "to take less, if he likes." He may not leave his cab to take care of itself, may not "sing, make a noise or cause a disturbance;" he must temper his pace to a "town trot," and "keep to the righthand side of the road."

# LEMONS AS MEDICINE.

Many a Cure Is Effected by These Simple and Palatable Remedies

Lemon inice sweetened with loaf or crushed sugar will relieve a cough. For feverishness and an unnatural

thirst soften a lemon by rolling on a hard surface, cut off the top, add sugar and work it down into the lemon with a fork, then suck it slowly. During the warm months a sense of coolness, comfort and invigoration can be produced by a free use of lemonade.

For six large glasses of lemonade use six large, juicy lemons. Roll on a hard surface so that the juice can be easily extracted. Peel and slice. Add snfficient sugar to sweeten and stir it well into the juice before adding the water. Hot lemonade will break up a cold if

taken at the start. Make it the same as cold lemonade, only use boiling water instead of cold water and use about onehalf as much sugar. A piece of lemon, or stale bread mois-

tened with lemon juice, bound on a corn will cure it. Renew night and morning. The first application will produce soreness, but if treatment is persisted in for a reasonable length of time a cure will be effected.

The discomfort caused by sore and tender feet may be lessened, if not entirely cured, by applying slices of lemons on the feet.

To cure chilblains take a piece of lemon, sprinkle fine salt over it and rob the feet well. Repeat if necessary.

Lemon juice will relieve roughness and vegetable stains on the hands. After having the hands in bot soapsuds rub them with a piece of lemon. This will prevent chapping and make the hands soft and white.-Philadelphia

WHY THOUSANDS OF INDIANS MELT-ED AWAY BEFORE FORTY MEN.

Captain McCabe Knew the Sloux Better Than They Knew Themselves, and They Knew the Captain and His Men Were Dead Shots and Also Scalp Takers.

In the pioneer days, to reach Montana set considering the condition of the from Cheyenne, in Wyoming, required we ther and was a sine as in every par. a roundabout journey that involved a double crossing of the Rocky mountains. with a change of base at Salt Lake City. The United States government brought about a better condition of travel by constructing a trail through the Gallatin valley along the course of the Gunpowder river, reaching around the base of the mountains in a curvilinear form, which avoided the heights of the Rockies. To protect this route from marauding Inlians three forts were built—Reno, Phil Kearny and C. F. Smith. These were garrisoned by United States troops.

In 1866 the murderous Sioux from the Yellowstone valley pursued a sanguinary course up through the Gallatin valley and into Montana. It was marked by rapine and plunder. They besieged Fort Reno and killed many of its garrison, including a brother of A. K. McClure. They environed Fort Phil Kearny, and wiped from the face of the earth every human being whose walls it failed to protect. Then they surrounded Fort C. Smith, where 200 Union soldiers found themselves surrounded by more than 1,000 death seeking Indians. Escape seemed impossible. A courier got word of this condition of affairs to General Hancock, who was then stationed at St. Paul, and he sent a messenger to the governor of Montana at Bozeman, calling upon him to relieve the besieged garrison. The chief executive of the territory of Montana at that time was Green Clay Smith, who, by the way, recently died in Washington, a Baptist clergyman. He had been a member of congress from Kentucky, but President Lincoln made him territorial governor of Montana. He was seated on the porch of his residence in Bozeman when Hancock's message was handed to him. To a visitor from the east, who was seated by his side, and who is authority for this narrative, he said:

"What in the name of heaven can I do? Fort C. F. Smith is 250 miles away. The country between here and there is filled with Sioux Indians. Our militia force consists of exactly 427 men. Not a man of them could reach Fort C. F. Smith alive. I am absolutely powerless. However, I will send for Colonel Howie.
